N. Y. Stock Trend Continues Upward

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 - (AP) - In one of the sharpest advances of the year, the stock market last week continued its march into new high ground.

The persistent push took the market to the best levels of the last 22 years as measured by the Associated Press average of 60 stocks. The AP average added \$2.30 on the week, the second straight rise, and closed at \$124.40, a new 1952 high and the best since June 6, 1930. A week ago the market was up \$2.60.

Volume for the four trading days came to a big 8,112,000 shares. Daily average was 2,028,000. The rate of trading hasn't been topped in the last 13 months. Railroads and steels had a prominent part in the advance all week. Fine earnings reports and excellent prospects formed the basis for the buying enthusiasm.

Canadian stocks closed the week higher. McIntyre and Hiram Walker both closed with a gain of 1/2. Distillers Seagram advanced 1/2 and International Nickel was up 1/2. Canadian Pacific and Dome Mines dropped 1/4 and 1/2 respectively. On the curb, Royalite Oil advanced 1/2, Giant Yellowknife slipped 1/2, and Lake Shore was not quoted.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, Nov. 30 - (AP) - Steelmakers entered this winter of record production with much larger stockpiles of coke, scrap steel and iron than they had a year ago. Steel magazine said today.

The weekly metalworking trades magazine said the Dec. 1 scrap stockpiles were 6,800,000 tons against 4,400,000 tons on hand in 1951 when a national drive was on to collect more. There are 28,800,000 net tons of coke at producers' ovens. Steel said, against only 1,700,000 a year ago.

One stockpile at furnaces and lower lake docks stood at 51,000,000 net tons, with vessels still bringing additional cargoes in. With winter rail shipments, the total should be enough, although it is under the 54,900,000 tons a year ago.

Bigger stockpiles are needed because the steel industry capacity is six per cent greater than it was last Dec. 1 and is still growing.

In spite of the Thanksgiving holiday, production last week held unchanged from the previous week at 106 per cent of capacity.

Record Grain Shipments Are Expected

OTTAWA, Nov. 30 - (CP) - Canada's grain men have opened full throttle on the biggest grain-moving rush of the season.

With the Great Lakes navigation freeze-up less than two weeks away, freighters are rushing millions of tons of wheat and other grains down the St. Lawrence River into marketing ports. Transportation history is being made east, west and north.

Transport Controller R. W. Milner estimates that when the freeze-up comes Dec. 6, he will have moved 200,000,000 bushels of grain from the lakehead since Aug. 1; another 40,000,000 bushels to Vancouver and 8,500,000 bushels to the northern port of Churchill.

"All these are record or near-record movements," Mr. Milner said in an interview Wednesday. "And they're all being accomplished without a control order—strictly through co-operation among the rail and ship operators and the grain trade."

"It is difficult to tell what may happen next spring but it looks like we will be making transportation history in the current crop year."

The previous peak movement from country delivery points on the prairies was 672,000,000 bushels shipped last year.

Telegraph Co. Sues Candidates In Toronto Election

TORONTO, Nov. 30 - (CP) - Three more Communist candidates for civic offices are being sued by the Canadian Pacific Telegraph Company for alleged use of CPT forms in the campaign.

A temporary injunction to stop such use of the forms was issued Friday against Mrs. Edna Ryerson, Charles Sims and Mrs. Margaret Reeves.

Thursday similar action was taken against Stewart Smith, Norman Freed and R. M. Laxer. Canadian Pacific officials said forms were mailed out with the regular CPT masthead and the word "urgent" in block letter followed by the campaign message of the candidates.

Board Order No. 12 MINIMUM PRICES - CONSIGNMENT SALES

PURSUANT to the provision of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Scheme as authorized by the provisions of the Agricultural Products Marketing (Prince Edward Island) Act; the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board hereinafter called the "Potato Board" hereby orders and determines as follows:

(1) From and after midnight of November 28th, 1952 and until further ordered the minimum price at which table stock potatoes of any variety may be bought from producers shall be \$1.90 per 75 lbs.

(2) The above price shall be the minimum price to be quoted and paid to producers in respect of bulk graded stock delivered by any producer at his nearest shipping point.

Restaurant Finds Customers Honest

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 30 - (CP) - Letting the customers decide their own charges and pay their own bills at the cash register can be interesting for a restaurateur. But it has its headaches.

Paul Arsens, proprietor of two local cafes who is conducting the experiment in both establishments, said Thursday that people never stop asking questions, and the telephone never stops ringing.

"The New York news service and two radio systems have kept in contact with us since we started this scheme last Monday," he said. "We're still getting letters, wires and telephone calls from all over the continent."

Two Victoria men between them had soup, veal cutlets, halibut steak, sirloin tips, macaroni and cheese, two fruit salads, two cups of coffee.

"They didn't pay a cent," Arsens said. "They just got up and walked out."

His volume of business has been double the normal for the first half of the week, he said, and receipts are higher than they would have been if checks had been given - despite the non-payers.

Ice Cream Pulls Movie Empire Out of the Red

LONDON, Nov. 30 - (AP) - Film magnate J. Arthur Rank says his film empire lost money at the box office in the last 12 months but cleaned up £1,151,000 selling ice cream to movie-goers.

The country's leading film producer-distributor let magistrates court in on this trade secret Friday when he appeared to explain why one of his company's London movie palaces - The Gaumont - did not exhibit enough British-made second features.

The hearing was adjourned until next week after Rank declared that although British-made first features are generally of good quality, the standard of production for second features was not high. The Gaumont, which regularly shows a double bill, has been losing money for years, he said.
