Salmon for a Cent Apiece.

BRITISH COLUMBIA RIVERS SWARMING WITH THE ROYAL FISH.

A New Westminster despatch says: This is the year for the big run of salmon, which occurs every fourth year, and the Fraser river is literally alive with the silver beauties, which form so important a part of British Columbia's wealth and her natural resources. On the 12th July the so-called eye, the choicest of the salmon family, were observed to be coming up the river in small lots. Soon, however, their numbers increased and with such wonderful rapidity that the river is now chock full of the funny treasures; and the canneries which are running are taxed to their utmost capacity to pack the vast quantities of fish which are being caught, as they are coming by hundreds of thousands. No such large and extensive run of salmon has been known before. The river, from its mouth to above New Westminster, is studded with the fishing boats of the various canneries. An instance, and one which is fully authenticated, is that of a boat which took 384 fish in one haul, and commenced landing them on the wharf in exactly fifty-five minutes from the time of starting. The total average pack will be twenty thousand cases to each cannery engaged, making the probable total pack of the Fraser river canneries for this season from 120,000 to 130,000 cases. On Saturday last (August 1st.) Ewen's cannery did the biggest day's packing ever done on the Fraser river, canning a total of 1,400 cases in one day, the highest previous record being 1,275 cases. The canneries have been paying their fishermen from three to five cents a fish, but owing to the plentiful supply fish have been offered and sold for one cent each salmon during the past week, they being willing to accept such a small price rather than throw the fish overboard. They claim that in previous seasons the cost of packing has amounted to about \$3.25 a case, while this season it will be reduced to from \$2.75 to \$3.00. If such is the case it is certain that a fair margin of profit can be made on the present ruling selling prices, which are \$3.50 a case.

Working on Sunday.
