Matheson Sees Causeway Delay

Provincial Liberal Leader A. W. Matheson, commenting on the Prime Minister's austerity program said yesterday that the people had the right to be informed of the situation before the election was called.

He said however, that the people of the Maritimes were "behind in their thinking" on a election issue. "The people of Quebec and Ontario knew what was happening and voted accordingly. So did B.C.," the leader stated.

The hope for the causeway is gone for a while at least, he said, "and so are the other wild projects that were promised. It is easy for the government to give away what it has not got."

Commenting on the provincial political picture, he said it was hard to say what a new election might be forthcoming. "But I know what I would do if I were in their place," he noted. He did not elaborate.

He said he understood from a government minister that there would be no by-election in 4th Prince, but noted that this was certainly not definite. He said he hoped to see George Mackay back into provincial politics.

Two Contest S'ide Council Seat Today

SUMMERSIDE — Two candidates are contesting the by-election in Summerside's East Ward today for the council seat made vacant by the death a few weeks ago of Councillor Llewellyn Roberts.

Automobile dealer D. A. E. MacDonald and Harry Mathew, an employee of Johnston's Sheet Metal Works are vying for the seat in the second by-election held in the town this year.

Mayor J. E. Morrison, a former councillor, resigned his seat in February to contest the mayoralty and a by-election resulted in Garnet Ross winning the office of acclamation.

The winning candidate today will serve until next February when the late Coun. Rogers' term will expire.

The polling booth is located in the C.N.E. express office and will be open from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.
