Local and Other Items

A PRODUCTIVE MINE.—The Hurricane Point gold mine, at Isaac's Harbor has produced \$34,000 worth of gold in 11 months. The November product was worth \$4,600. —Halifax Herald.

TAXATION IN HALIFAX.—The civil taxation of Halifax this year will be \$321,000, which is \$7,000 more than last year. The city schools are to cost \$8,000, about \$4,000 more than last year.

WATERWORKS AND SEWERAGE.—A by-law to authorize \$110,000 in debentures for the construction of a waterworks and sewerage system will be submitted to Oshawa ratepayers on Saturday, January 21.

A DENTIST PUNISHED.—In the County Court at Hamilton, Ont., a few days ago in the suit of Miss Leaver vs. Dr. Baxter, for negligence when extracting a tooth for plaintiff, in not warning her against the danger of inflammation and not telling her to return for further treatment, the jury returned a verdict for \$100 and costs.

Although pretty badly scared, he remarked somewhat complacently on being helped out that he had saved his goose anyhow.
