

# McGill Professor Discusses Quebec Nationalism Uprush

MONTREAL (CP) — The uprush of nationalism in Quebec is recent years results from social and economic frustrations suffered by a new generation of leaders in the province but the movement still lacks mass support, a McGill professor said Wednesday.

Charles Taylor, who teaches in the university's department of economics and political science, contended that modern Quebec nationalism is something new and must find fulfillment in social and economic changes.

He sketched the province's "new intelligentsia" at a session of the American Sociological Association's four-day convention which closes today.

About separatism, Mr. Taylor said for the present it has the symbolic value although it is "hardly very powerful."

Many of the new nationalists now raising protests occupy a wider variety of jobs than their predecessors and find themselves the victims of "unconscious discrimination" by the Anglo-Saxons whom he claim control the Quebec economy.

Many French-speaking Canadians refuse to abandon their culture to get ahead, he said, and resolve instead to forge an economic and social order where its preservation is compatible to such advancement.

Many of the resulting strains have produced the reform programs instituted by the present provincial government of Premier Jean Lesage, Mr. Taylor said.

These programs placed much emphasis on control of utilities and establishment of a new steel industry by French-speaking Canadians for themselves.

In more radical form this desire for control of their society emphasizes not internal reform but "the reality or symbolic trappings of political power, that is separatism."

## Top Plowmen Competing At Dundas Championships

A competitive plowing event that began 24 years ago will feature a two-day competition this week on Wednesday and Thursday at Dundas, in addition to a general agricultural fair and an outstanding exhibit of handicrafts, home cooking and other displays of mid-day home-making skill.

The big feature of the two-day fair so far as plowing is concerned, is the provincial championship match on Thursday afternoon. The King's County champions and runner-up will be chosen Wednesday, and they will vie for supremacy on Thursday with the Prince County and Queen's County champions.

Arthur Hudson, Casanopee, and Lawrence Harris, Knutsford, are the men who will carry the Prince County colors into the competition. For Mr. Hudson this will be nothing new as he has been the county champion now on four occasions.

The Queens County champions named Saturday at Pownall are Barry Wilson, and Harold Godfrey of Cornwall, and Arthur Jones, Pownall.

Edwin Mills, Bay Fortune, the Kings County champion last year, is the runner-up in the provincial meet, along with Carl Willis, Charlottetown, who is representing this province next week in the Canadian Plowing Championship match at Rudensell Park.

It was back in the autumn of 1941 that the King's County Carry On Canada Corps received the idea of staging a plowing match to raise funds for the many efforts made on the home front towards the successful prosecution of the war.

From a small and humble beginning the Dundas Plowing Match has grown into a two-day affair, and for some years now it has been part of a two-day agricultural fair which provides competitive spots for most of the animals and other products of an average Island farm.

Albert Acorn, Bridgetown who won the first tractor class at Dundas, has for some years been the efficient secretary.

Leslie Hunter, Stratheona, was the chairman of the Carry-On-Canada Corps and he has been president of the plowing match association since it took over following the end of the war. So the same man has been in the co-ordinating post now for almost a quarter of a century.

The first day of competition provides classes for senior gang plow contestants, single furrow walking plows for novices, and for boys under 16, a tractor class for boys and girls under 16 years, tractor classes for two and three sods, and for the county championship.

In addition Ayrshire, Hereford and Angus cattle will be shown, and carriage and saddle horse classes will be judged, along with pony classes.

On Thursday the provincial Esso championship class is the big attraction, but other plowing classes will provide opportunities for juniors to show their skill with the gang plow; the single furrow open class will be held; there will be a two and three-sod tractor class for ladies and a "utility class" class for the contestants to turn their furrows at field speed. This one is sponsored by the Perfection Dairy people.

Holstein Jersey and Shorthorn cattle will be judged on Thursday. There will also be classes for heavy horses and general purpose animals, in addition to classes for swine.

A program of sports for seniors is slated for Wednesday, and for junior athletes on Thursday afternoon.

All of the classes are open in the province with the exception of the cattle, sheep and hog classes, and the 4-H club program, which are restricted to entries from King's County and that portion of Queen's County east of the Hillsboro River.

Plowing competitions get underway at 10:00 a.m., livestock judging commences at 11:00 a.m., and horse judging commences at one o'clock in the afternoon.
