

CURRENT NOTES.

The time was, it is said, when teachers and literary men in Scotland, lived upon oatmeal. The times have changed. There are thirty-nine professors in the university of Edinburgh. Of these eighteen receive \$5,000 or more a year each. Five of these get \$10,000 per annum, the Professor of Anatomy being in receipt of an income of \$16,000 a year. The Professor of Latin gets \$7,500, the Professor of Greek 6,500, and the Professor of Mathematics \$7,000. Two of the teachers last mentioned are under thirty-three years of age. Ten of the twenty-eight Professors in Glasgow receive over \$5,000, and three over twice that sum. The salary of the Latin Professor is \$11,000 and of the Greek and Latin teachers \$9,000 and \$10,000 respectively. The statistics from the London Spectator, show that the Scotch Professor has his comforts. It will be seen that he need not live on oatmeal—more especially as he gets well pensioned off when his work is done.

That British pluck and endurance can be matched against the world, is an old story, but one the essential truth of which is constantly being shown by fresh manifestations. The latest arena for the mettle of young Englishmen, is the Himalayan Mountains. The Alps have become a somewhat stale thing to the more venturesome, and the ascent even of Mont Blanc, is coming to be regarded as an enterprise, worthy only of mere tender-foot. A Mr. Graham has been doing wonders lately, among the lofty peaks of the Himalayas. Hitherto it has been a popular impression that at the elevation of 20,000 feet or even less life was almost impossible, if not indeed wholly so. Mr. Graham has shown this to be a mistake. He has proved the possibility of both breathing and living at an elevation several thousand feet higher than Mont Blanc and of undergoing the fatigue of much longer and more ascents than those from Chamouni or Zermatt. When last heard from this adventurous gentleman was preparing to attempt the conquest of the famous Kinchinjunga, a giant which towers to the height of 28,000 feet.

According to the London Times statisticians have pronounced the United States to be not only potentially, but actually richer than the United Kingdom. Counting the houses, furniture, manufactures, railways, shipping, buffalo, lands, cattle, crops, investments, and roads, it is estimated that there is a grand total in the United States of \$49,770,000,000. Great Britain is credited with something less than \$40,000,000,000, or nearly \$10,000,000,000 less than the United States. The wealth per inhabitant in Great Britain is estimated at \$1,160, and in the United States at \$995. With regard to the remuneration of labor, 21 to capital and 23 to Government. In the United States 72 parts to the labor, 23 to capital and five to Government. The significant feature of this diagnosis is the distribution of the produce of labor, the laborer obtaining 72 per cent. in the United States, where protection is enjoyed, while in Great Britain the laborer only 56 per cent.

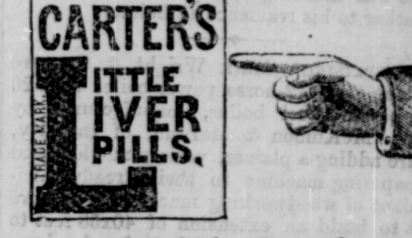
