PREPARING FOR THE FIGHT.

Troops Moving and Massing.

BRITISH CABINET COUNCIL CALLED.

Toronto Will Offer a Detachment of Troops—Government Does Not Move.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, September 20.—The steamer Jetulga will take 500 troops bound for Natal today, and will embark a rifle brigade at the island of Crete for the Cape.

According to a despatch from Durban, Natal, the Premier of Cape Colony says that the alarm of the people of Natal at the unprotected condition of the border towns is quite unwarranted, and that all efforts to incite the Zulus have failed.

It is announced that the British first-class cruisers Terrible and Powerful have been ordered to the Cape. They have reliefs on board capable of forming a naval brigade of a thousand men.

PRETORIA, Sept. 20.—The reply of the government to the latest British note is variously commented upon. But the Pretoria Press, printed in English and Dutch, and other papers, profess to believe that a Joint Commission will yet be held and that there is still a possibility of an understanding being reached.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Yesterday a summons was issued late in the afternoon for a Cabinet Council, which, it is understood, will be held on Friday.

Lack of all excitement in official circles bears evidence of the deliberate manner in which the highest officials are handling the crisis. Nor is it by any means correct that the cabinet will adopt extreme measures in sight the compromising nature of the Boer reply.

This deliberation on the part of the government is interpreted not only in London but in other European capitals as a desire on the part of Great Britain, to gain time while the transports are hurrying to Cape Colony.

In the meantime the movement of troops proceeds. The first-class army reserve, as a whole, will not be called upon. The force for the Transvaal has not been drawn entirely from the 1st army corps, but from the 1st, 2nd and 3rd army corps.

The Central News says, "on most reliable authority," that in consequence of repeated representation made to them from Natal, the government have undertaken to move 10,000 troops from India to Natal within a week.

Advices to hand from Natal state that nobody there would be surprised if "that dratted stray shot" were fired at any moment now, so great is the tension.

TORONTO, Sept. 20.—A movement is on foot here to offer the services of the Twelfth York Rangers to the Imperial Government for service in the Transvaal.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—The Government has not taken any steps towards raising a regiment for service in the Transvaal.

CECIL RHODES' JOKE.

Presented Transvaal Delegates With a Fine Lion.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 19.—The delegates of the Agricultural Union were entertained at luncheon a day or two ago by Mr. Cecil Rhodes. The delegates from the Transvaal made speeches, predicting that peace would be maintained. Mr. Rhodes offered them a fine lion, which, although it somewhat embarrassed them, the delegates accepted and took to Pretoria today.

A Pretoria despatch says:—"All commandants and field cornets have been ordered to supply as once returns showing the number of men available for field service, and the points where they can be concentrated."

MUST WEAR MOUSTACHES.

Clean Shaven British Officers are Called Down.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—The Secretary of War, the Marquis of Lansdowne, has issued a circular to the general officers saying that he has noticed that a predominant fashion exists among young officers to shave the upper lip, and adding that this is much to be regretted. The result is that many unfertile lips are being coerced for moustaches. The regulation against shaving the upper lip has been little observed of recent years, and its revival is unpopular.

Rebellion in Venezuela.

CARACAS, Venezuela, Sept. 19.—Before President Andrade with the Government troops was able to reach Valencia, that town had been captured by the insurgent general, Cipriano Castro. The Government troops garrisoning the place made a gallant fight, but were unable to hold out until President Andrade arrived with reinforcements. The President is now at La Victoria.

London Satisfied.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—The selection of Gen. Sir George Stewart White to command the troops meets with universal approval, as also does the announcement that in the event of war General Sir Redvers Buller will take supreme command in South Africa.

The French Budget.

PARIS, Sept. 19.—The French budget for 1900 shows an increase in the estimated expenditure of 45,000,000 francs. The war and marine ministries ask for 36,000,000 francs increase for the supplementary force in Algiers and the building of new warships. The national debt amounts to thirty milliards.

France and the Transvaal.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The Paris correspondent of the Tribune says: Great hopes have until today prevailed at the Quai d'Orsay that the Queen, who is known to have exerted to the utmost her personal influence to avoid a conflict in the Transvaal would be able to maintain peace; but information now received at the French Foreign Office produces the belief that war is inevitable.

It is officially denied at the Quai d'Orsay that the French Government has instructed M. Auber, French Consul General at Pretoria, to support in any way the propositions made by Great Britain to President Kruger. The French attitude is that of absolute neutrality. Popular feeling here condemns Mr. Chamberlain for publishing each step of the negotiations before President Kruger, who can do nothing without first obtaining consent of the Boers, is able to reply. The French sympathy is unmistakably with Kruger and against England.

The Line Drawn.

PRINCETON, Ind., Sept. 19.—The school trustees of Princeton are having considerable trouble about a Cuban boy whom an army officer brought home with him from Cuba. The Cuban went to school yesterday with the white children, when the parents of the latter announced they would withdraw their children if the foreigner was permitted to attend the school. They claim he must go to the negro school. The trustees withdrew the Cuban temporarily.

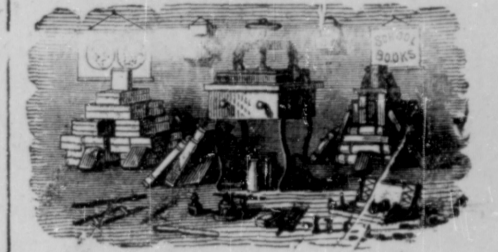
