Would Consider It Great Honor To Represent Queens

"If the Liberal people of Queens County decided they would like me to represent them, I would consider it a great honor, and would give serious consideration to such a proposal," The Rev. Lloyd Henderson said yesterday afternoon when commenting on local rumors that he might be asked to accept a Liberal nomination in Queen's County.

Rev. Mr. Henderson, who came direct from the Liberal convention in Ottawa where he was a candidate for the National leadership, arrived in his native Freeland, P. E. I., to visit his elderly mother.

"If nominated in Queen's," said Mr. Henderson, "I would want to know its citizens individually, and to let them judge my sincerity of purpose." He said many might wonder whether or not he was sincere, and he added, "I am, with all my heart, but the electors have got to know that by knowing me personally, and if I campaign there, I will be in every home in the country if it is humanly possible to do so."

NEED GOOD LEADERSHIP

Mr. Henderson said he was active in politics because he believed that the world is desperately in need of good, sound, honest, moral, religious leadership today.

"There is a lot of people who like to separate religion and life. They want religion for Sunday, and life for the rest of the week," he said.

In regard to religion and politics, Mr. Henderson, Mayor of Portage La Prairie, and minister of it's First Presbyterian Church, said, "I don't think Canada can go ahead today with religious intolerance. We must adopt the attitude that, for me my religion is right, but I must let the other man pick his. I am not going to spend my life fighting Roman Catholics, Baptists, United Church people, or any other creeds," said Mr. Henderson. "They have as much right to their religion as I have to mine, and I respect them, and expect them also to be good churchmen in their own church."

Mr. Henderson said that if nominated in Queen's County he would continue his campaign for strong, dynamic, moral, imaginative, progressive, and aggressive leadership by the Liberal Party.

He said that if he was a successful candidate in the next Liberal Government he believed his position would be in the cabinet.

Glenwood Man Is Flown To Hospital In Halifax

Roy MacDonald, 60, of Glenwood near O'Leary, who was in critical condition as the result of a fractured skull, was flown to Victoria General Hospital in Halifax last evening in a mercy flight from R.C.A.F. Station Summerside.

Mr. MacDonald fell on the ice fracturing his skull about a week ago while fishing eels and was confined to the Community Hospital in O'Leary. However, the

attending physician, Dr. L. G. Dewar, yesterday found his condition to have worsened and made arrangements to have Mr. MacDonald flown to Halifax where he will be attended by Dr. Harold Tucker of the Neuro-Surgical Department of the Victoria General Hospital.

Mr. MacDonald, who was taken to the R.C.A.F. Station by the ambulance of Mr. Claude Jelly, was accompanied on the

flight by Mrs. Earl Jelley, R.N., O'Leary and Flying Officer Agnes Broadfoot, R.N. of the R.C.A.F. Station.

Piloting the Dakota aircraft was Squadron Leader Stan Pelland, while the co-pilot was Flight Lieutenant Harry Saville.

The flight time is about one hour from Summerside to Dartmouth.

Says Sputnik 1 Burned Up Jan. 4

LONDON (Reuters)—The Soviet news agency Tass said Monday night that Sputnik I ceased to exist Jan. 4.

It was the first official Russian confirmation that the satellite had disintegrated.

Tass said it had been established through observation and trajectory calculations that the first satellite penetrated the denser layers of the atmosphere and evaporated on that date.

The agency said that its penetration into the denser atmospheric layers and disintegration were not registered directly.
