The Revising Officer for Queen's.

FROM all quarters are heard expressions of annoyance and disgust at the Herald's advocacy of the appointment of Judge Alley as Revising Officer for Queen's County.

One of the electors reminds THE EXAMINER that it has missed a strong fact showing the animus of Judge Alley and the intensity of his desire to deprive franchise voters of their right to vote in the Dominion election of 1878—the fact that so eager was Judge Alley to strike the names of our young men off the list of that year that he actually, contrary to all precedent, obtained counsel to appear before the Supreme Court in support of his decision.

This is indeed "a strong fact," a fact which justifies the determined opposition of electors to Judge Alley's appointment. The prevailing sentiment is that it is bad enough that, according to the law, Judge Alley is the Judge to whom appeals will be made in case a Barrister be appointed Revising Officer, and it would be altogether too bad to have him set over the electors to work his own sweet will, without check and without recourse to any other authority or power.

The Prospects of Trade

Commenting on the prospects of trade, the Montreal Gazette says: "The promise of a turn in the tide is supported by many factors. Trade in the United States is distinctly better, and a revival there cannot be without influence in Canada. Taken all round, the harvest has been a good one, in Manitoba and the Northwest exceptionally so, and as farmers carried into the new crop year a considerable quantity of grain from last season, their condition should be one of prosperity, the movement of cereals should increase and the circulation of money quicken and enlarge. Imports continue to decline, in value more than in volume, partly because of the fall in prices, partly because of the prudence of importers, partly because of the growth of home industries, but that fact tells quite as much, indeed, rather more, to the benefit and stability of trade than the reverse. The cotton trade, a staple industry, has unquestionably improved in recent months; mills are working on longer time, prices have hardened, a margin of profit is given manufacturers, while the diversity of products removes the danger of over-production and glut of the market that before occurred. A rapid revival of business is not to be anticipated, but a gradual recovery seems to be reasonably assured."

The Northwest rebellion, the Franchise Act, the Fisheries, with the prospect of reciprocity with the United States, and several other questions of minor importance were treated by Mr. Hackett in forcible and intelligent style which appeared to carry conviction of its reliability to all present, as there was no exception taken by any of Mr. Hackett's statements, notwithstanding that the Opposition were fairly represented at the meeting. The best of order prevailed during the meeting, and Mr. Hackett was listened to with the closest attention throughout.

St. Joseph's Convent.

WHERE THE BAZAAR IS TO BE HELD.

THE new wing of St. Joseph's Convent, Pownal Street, is rapidly approaching completion. The exterior is almost finished, and the interior is ready for plastering. In dimensions the new wing is forty-three feet front, and runs back a distance of one hundred and ten feet. The wall is twenty-seven feet, and the height from ground to the apex of the roof is fifty-four feet. When completed the old building and wing will be ample for the purposes for which the Convent is intended.

The main entrance to the building is on Pownal Street. To the right, on entering the spacious hall—which runs to the centre of the wing—is a stairway which leads to the second story, and at the end of the hall is another stairway, which leads to the same flat. Off the main hall, to the right, are two well-lighted and airy class rooms, thirty-one by twenty-nine feet in size. These are divided by folding-doors, which on being opened, transform the class rooms into one large hall, sixty-two by fifty-eight feet in capacity. Beyond these classes and the main stairway, is a society hall, thirty-nine by thirty feet, which will be furnished for the use of the societies which hold meetings in the convent. The second flat will be occupied by three classes, similar in size to the ones below, and the society hall, while the attic will be used as a dormitory. The basement is conveniently laid off for kitchen, store rooms, recitation hall, etc. On the whole, the wing is well suited and will be well fitted for school purposes. It has connection with the old building from the main hall close to the front entrance, and to the chapel from the hall on the second floor. The building is of a neat style of architecture, of wood, with a substantial stone and brick foundation. Messrs. Sterling & Harris are the architects, and Mr. William McGuire, Morell, is the contractor.

The windows and doors of the building were manufactured by R. Palmer & Co. The design is elegant, and the workmanship reflects great credit on the firm. The new wing to St. Joseph's Convent is much required, owing to the popularity of the institution. The number of pupils at present in attendance is two hundred and thirty-eight. These, at present, occupy four class rooms, which would be considered small for half the number. But the new wing will remedy this, and not only accommodate the present pupils, but give ample accommodation for double the number. The Bazaar to be held to-morrow and Thursday is for the purpose of paying off part of the cost of its construction. We therefore hope to see it liberally patronized by the public generally.

Meeting of the School Board.

THE regular meeting of the School Board was held last evening at 7.30. The Chairman, W. E. Dawson, and T. Handrahan, J. Ings, T. Foley, D. Farquharson, A. Kennedy and J. B. Macdonald, Esqs, were present. We understand that business of considerable importance in reference to the educational interests of the city was before the Board. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. Professor Mellish, Principal of the Upper Prince Street School, tendered his resignation, giving the usual three months' notice. John Ings and T. Handrahan, Esqs., Committee on School Property, reported on the state of the West Kent Street School, and explained the nature of some repairs they recommended. T. Foley and J. B. Macdonald, Esqs., Finance Committee, reported on the accounts of the Board for the past year, stating that after a thorough examination of the receipts and expenditures of the Board, and vouchers therefor, they found everything in a satisfactory state. On motion of T. Handrahan, Esq., and seconded by A. Kennedy, Esq., and carried, that D. Montgomery, Esq., be appointed grading officer for the ensuing year at the same salary that he had last year. On motion of John Ings, Esq., seconded by T. Handrahan, Esq., and carried unanimously, that T. Foley and A. Kennedy, Esqs, be appointed a committee to prepare the estimates for the ensuing year. An application from Mr. Jas. Callaghan, who lives outside the limits of the city, for leave to send two of his boys to St. Patrick's School was received. The request was granted on payment of the ordinary tuition fees. After considerable discussion by the Board on the selection of a successor to Professor Mellish, whose resignation had been received, it was moved by Mr. Foley, seconded by Mr. Farquharson, and carried unanimously, that, as it was of the highest importance that a teacher of experience and scholarly attainments should be secured for the position of Principal of the Upper Prince Street School, it would be well to defer the appointment to the next meeting of the Board. After the transaction of other business, the meeting adjourned.

The other day the steambot from St. John, N. B., to Boston, was met in the harbor of the last mentioned place by the Health officers. Every man, woman and child on board of the boat were summoned on deck and the doctor insisted on seeing for himself whether the passengers had been vaccinated or not. Some ladies demurred at the proceeding, and declared that he could permit no one to land in Boston unless he had passed them. The contract, if satisfactorily executed, shall continue in force for the term of four years, provided always the workmanship and material be satisfactory to the Postmaster General.

Each tender to state the price asked per bag in the form and manner prescribed by the form of tender, and to be accompanied by the written guarantee of two responsible parties, undertaking that in the event of the tender being accepted, the contract shall be duly executed by the party tendering for the price demanded. Undertakers also to become bound with the contractor in the sum of two thousand dollars for the due performance of the contract.
