

Woman Workers.

No feature of Boston life is more suggestive than the number of women who come into the city on the local trains from seven till nine in the morning. It is suggestive, because it is an outgrowth of the new condition of affairs which Mrs. Sutherland Orr calls "the renaissance of womanhood." It is a condition that shows how women have entered into business and industrial life, and how important a factor they are in economic interests. A half century ago it would have been looked upon as a highly indecorous proceeding that women should thus come into open competition in the labor market. An aged Cincinnati, who is well known as a prominent advocate of political enfranchisement for women, relates that when she was young it was not considered proper for a woman to enter the post-office. At that time all the women who are now crowding and over-crowding the labor market stayed quietly at home; economized rather than earned; endured poverty, privation in every form of material and spiritual interests, and for the most part endured in silence and seclusion. If a woman did not marry she was probably a more or less unwelcome hanger-on, either as "the last ungathered rose" of her ancestral tree, or in the home of family relatives, where she accepted uncomplainingly burdens of service far greater than those that in this day yield her a comfortable and independent income. Now, in every city and town, women are crowding to the business centres. Boston is said to have a surplus of 1,800 women more than men; New York, 2,500, and Baltimore of 1,700. But aside from the exceptional women workers in the higher intellectual and artistic fields, the large number that enter market competition in the educational, decorative, professional, and industrial ranks, are among the most potent factors in the civilization of to-day. — Boston Traveller.

Royal Love Making.

How princes make love is told in the "Reminiscences of the Marquis Custine," which have just appeared in Paris. When the Czar Nikolaus was eighteen years old, he spent two days in Berlin, where he saw the Princess Charlotte, two years younger, and of a delicate beauty which at once attracted him. She however, showed no signs of reciprocating his affection. On the evening before his departure he sat next to the Princess at dinner. "I shall leave to-morrow," he suddenly remarked. Lady Dufferin in India.

India is indebted to Lady Dufferin for starting a movement which will not only supply a great want, but which also promises to have a powerful effect in paving the way for the most urgent of all Indian reforms, the amelioration of the position of women. There has just been established under her auspices as lady president a national association for supplying female medical aid to women in India. The Viceroy is patron, the Presidency Governors and Lieutenant-Governors are vice-patrons, and their wives vice-patronesses. The object is to supply in hospital wards and within private houses that medical care and advice which respectable native women will only accept from their own sex. It has been decided to make a sustained effort of an unsectarian and national character to organize and stimulate female medical education and mid-wives for hospitals and private houses. The association will provide scholarships for women under tuition, and will procure from Europe and America a sufficient number of skilled female medical teachers. The executive body consists of a small central committee working under the presidency of Lady Dufferin.

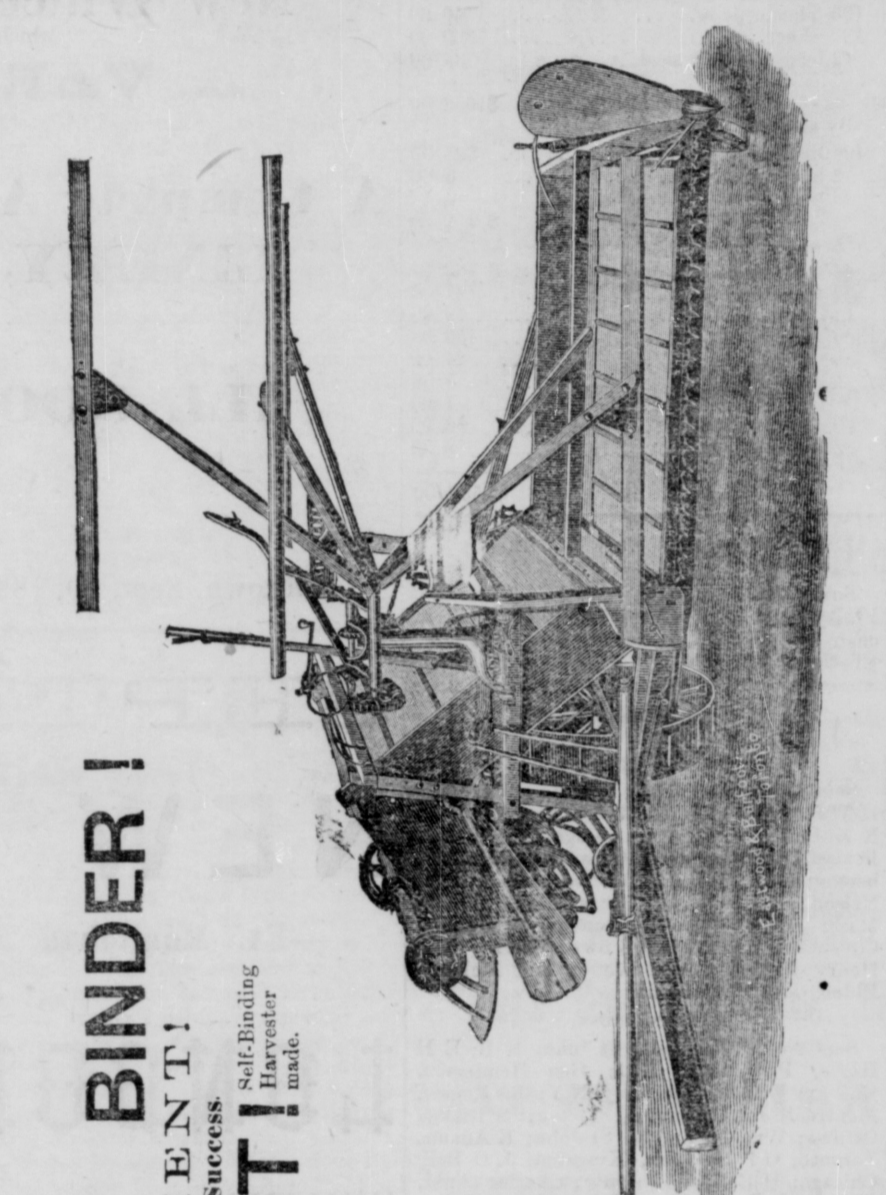

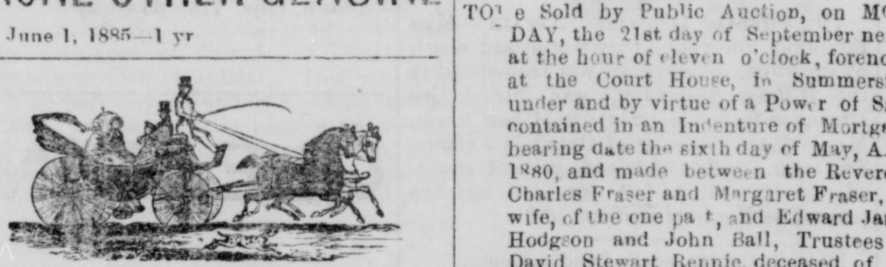
