The members listened with interest to a report of the National convention which was held at St. John, N.B., in October, and sent in by the provincial president, Mrs. Joseph MacDonald.

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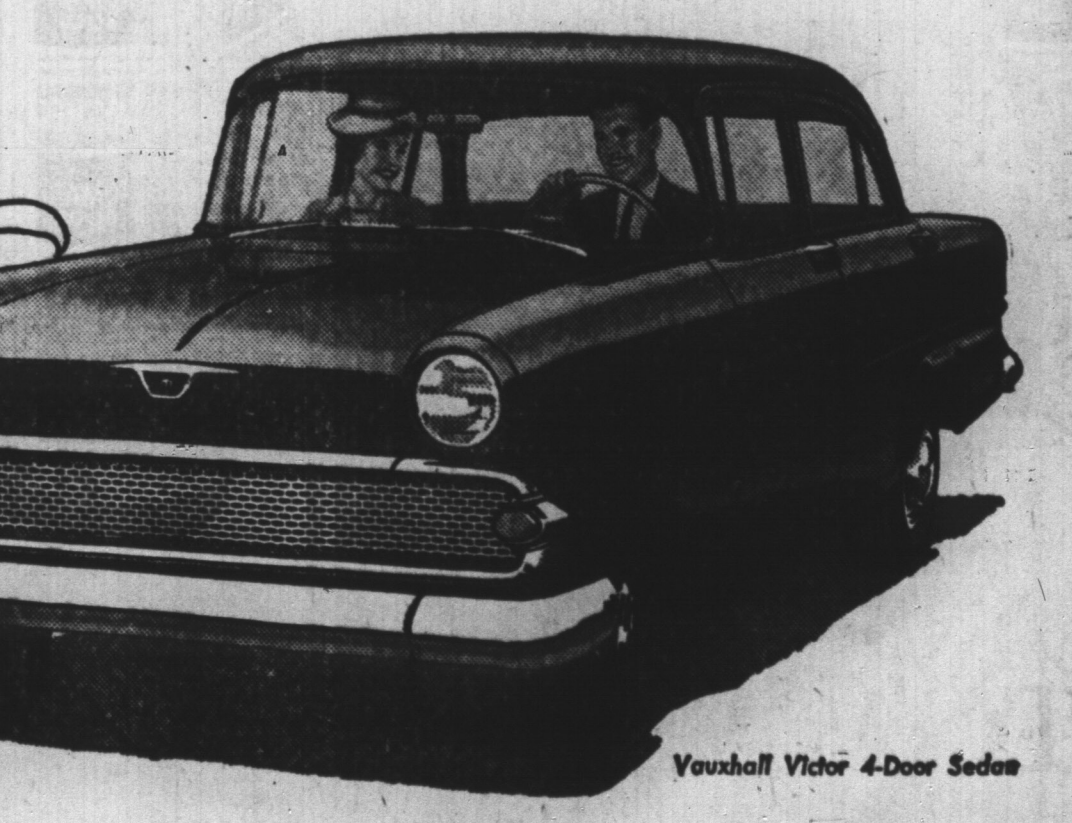
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
