# Prisoners' Services Asking Shorter Hours

The P.E.I. Civil Servants Association, at their annual meeting Tuesday night, passed a resolution which asks the government for a shorter, 40 hours work week.

The resolution stated that there was in the Civil Service, "considerable inequity in the number of hours worked by persons in various positions. The government will be petitioned to give consideration to instituting a maximum 40 hour work week, with overtime compensation for work in excess of 40 hours per week."

Association president, Dr. James Higgins, in giving his report to the meeting, said a resolution which asks the government for a shorter, 40 hours work week.

It was pointed out that the cost of running a motor vehicle has risen sharply over the past few years and that other provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act are being brought in by the federal government, which have raised their mileage rate from 10 cents to 12 cents per mile.

It was also proposed that the government make participation in the automobile ownership compulsory for all public servants.

It was suggested in one resolution that part-time employees who are employed at least half time in the government service should receive a proportionate share of the time worked and resolved that "part-time employees when employed at least half time on a continuous basis and paid a monthly salary should be entitled to vacation, sick and special leave on a proportionate basis to full-time employees."

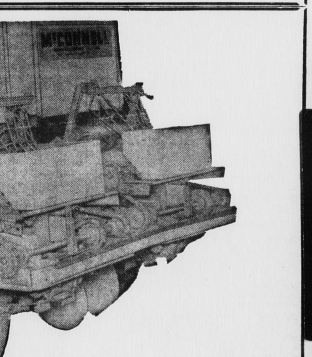
