Doctor Says Hormones Abused In Treatments

By Alton L. Blakelock (Associate Press Science Reporter) PHOENIX, Dec. 7 - (AP) - Hormones are being badly abused in treating some sex and mental problems, a psychiatrist said Thursday. Hormones, especially the sex ones, "are probably the most abused of all drugs, although vitamins and antibiotics are not far behind," Dr. Edwin F. Gildea of Washington University Medical School in St. Louis told the American Medical Association. The abuses "led to waste of millions of dollars, and do immeasurable harm to patients." This does not mean, he stressed, that there are not good medical uses for hormones. But he contended it hasn't been proved that the hormones, except insulin for

May Launch Economic Survey Of Maritimes

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 7 - (CP) - Steps toward the appointment of a royal commission to make an economic and industrial survey of the Maritime Provinces may be taken here tomorrow. The subject is expected to be prominent in discussion at an executive meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade. The board will consider implementation of resolutions and policies favored at its annual meeting in Charlottetown in October. At that time appointment of the commission was urged in a report presented by Dr. C. H. Blakely of Moncton, a past president of the Maritime organization. His proposal was approved by the Charlottetown meeting. In the past the provinces have carried out individual surveys of such factors as electric power potentialities, warehousing and land possibilities. Dr. Blakely's proposal would involve consolidating such data on a Maritime level, so that it would be readily available to those considering location within the Maritimes. The committee will be set up during Monday's meeting.

N. Y. Stocks Took Breather Last Week

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 - (AP) - The stock market took a breather last week after the sharp rise that has gone on virtually without interruption since late in October. Brokers considered the pause in the market a consolidation action that frequently follows close on the heels of a vigorous rise. Total business for the week came to 8,400,000 shares which compares with 8,112,000 shares for the four days the market was open a week ago. The daily average at 1,680,000 shares was under each of the two previous weeks but it is well above the daily average so far this year of about 1,202,000 shares. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks ended the week unchanged at \$112.40, only 10 cents under the new 1952 high established a week ago Tuesday. The market closed a week ago at a new high for the year, and on Monday it remained unchanged as measured by the Associated Press average of 60 stocks at \$112.40. Profit-taking put in an appearance to hold the market back. Tuesday's market edged up a dime to another new high, but there was a quiet decline in the next two days. The week ended with a rise of 60 cents in the average Friday, virtually all accounted for by strong railroads helped along by aircrafts and a few others. That made this week's close \$112.40, the same as the previous Friday. The five most active issues on the New York Stock Exchange last week were: New York Central up 1-4 at 22 1-4 with 98,100 shares traded, Packard Motor Car up 1-4 at 5 1-8, Pennsylvania Railroad up 1-4 at 21 1-2, International Telephone up 5-8 at 20 3-8, and Baltimore and Ohio unchanged at 24 3-4. The five most active stocks on the New York Curb Exchange last week were: Central Explorers off 2 3-8 at 5 1-8, Burek Corp. Ltd. off 3-16 at 1 1-4, Pancoast Oil off 1-4 at 3 3-8, Calvan Consolidated Oil up 5-16 at 6 1-16, and Canada Southern Oils up 5-8 at 10 3-4. Canadian issues closed mixed. Canadian Pacific and McIntyre each gained 1-2, International Nickel advanced 1-4, and Dome Mines dropped 1-8. Hiram Walker and Distillers Seagram both slipped 1-4. On the Curb, Royalite Oil was up 3-8, Giant Yellowknife slipped 1-4 and Lake Shore was not quoted.

BIRDS' HANDS

Birds' hands do not look like ours, nor are they actually called by that word; nevertheless, there are three of them: two alike, and an odd one. The pair go by the name feet; the odd one is known as a bill or a beak; and they are all wonderful substitutes for hands. An Osprey or Fish Hawk dives first into water and catches fish in strong talons which are used as fingers, but are much better at holding slippery fish. The soles of its pale blue feet have a rough covering, and the claws are long and well curved. The fish is held in a manner unusual for birds: two toes turn forwards, two backwards. With their powerful feet other Hawks and the Owls hold down small birds or mice and tear them to pieces with their hooked beaks. Every bill is in two sections: an upper, and a lower which is movable like our own lower jaw. All are tough, with sharp edges. But they are of different types, depending upon the use to which they are put, and are of various sizes; yet all are made to be employed like hands. The two sections, or "mandibles," as they are called, are ordinarily about the same length, or the upper slightly longer than the lower. However, the Skimmer has a longer lower section, because it flies close to the water, apparently "skimming" small fish off the top. A Merganser's long bill is fitted with tooth-like affairs for holding in the fish. A Kingfisher's beak is unusually capacious for the same reason. The Nighthawk and Swallows have short, flat, wide bills to grab flying insects in the air. Species that belong to the group known as Flycatchers have bristles or "whiskers" at the corners of their mouths to prevent insects from escaping. As probing the ground for worms requires a special bill, nature supplies the Woodcock with one like long pinners. Woodpeckers have bills like chisels for making holes in trees, and their excessively long tongues, used as fingers, pry out insects found deep down. The extremely long bill of a Hummingbird and its extraordinary tongue, which curls over on each side to form a double tube and also ends like a brush, delve into cup-shaped blossoms so the bird can suck up nectar. Both bill and feet get to work when a nest is to be built. With these three hands, long pieces of grass, hair, string, or bark are woven together neatly and efficiently. Are birds ever white?

Business Reports

MONTREAL, Dec. 7 - (CP) - Canadian Car and Foundry Co. Ltd., Saturday reported net profit of \$1,605,194 for the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, compared with \$962,282 the preceding year. The net was equal to \$4.01 on the "A" share and \$3.30 on the common, compared with \$2.41 on the "A" and \$1.54 on the common the previous year. Net working capital also increased, from \$9,836,124 last year to \$11,941,078. Income taxes totalled \$2,600,000 against \$1,147,000 the previous year. NEW YORK, Dec. 7 - (CP) - The world output of newsprint in 1951 is estimated by the Newsprint Service Bureau at a record high of approximately 10,350,000 tons or about five per cent more than in 1950. The countries of the western world produced more than 9,500,000 tons or about 93 per cent of the world total while output in the Communist area is estimated at slightly more than 700,000 tons. Far in the forefront among the world's producers of newsprint is Canada whose 1951 output of 5,516,000 tons represented nearly 54 per cent of the world total. The United States with output of 1,125,000 tons was next.

Hotel-Like Features In Novel Rest Room

SYDNEY, Australia - (CP) - Sydney's City Council is building a 500-room rest room for women in the heart of the city, but it won't be just for mothers and children. It will have bathrooms and dressing rooms and ironing boards for women who want to change before going to dances or the theatre. In addition, of course, there will be a crèche and feeding rooms, a children's bedroom and an open air playground for children - but there will be a three-hour limit on leaving children there. Four nurses will be on duty as well as maids to help. In the building there will be a refreshment room and a drug store, with a taxi rank outside.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, Dec. 7 - (AP) - Consumers now are using steel in almost as great a volume as it is being produced, and manufacturing needs seem to be gaining. Steel magazine said today. With the possible exception of farm equipment, "virtually every civilian durable goods manufacturing line is pushing the mills aggressively for every pound of steel available," the weekly Metalworking Journal reported. "Defence needs have not yet attained a peak," Steel added. Two-thirds of steel production in the first quarter of 1953 will be needed for the heavy tonnage carry-over from the current quarter, Steel said in its weekly review. "Substantial overflow from second to third quarter is likely," Steel continued, "barring order cancellations and delayed deliveries, which, at the moment, are conspicuous by their absence." The national ingot rate held unchanged last week at 106 per cent of rated capacity. Output has held at about that pace for more than two months.
