EX-GOVERNOR LAIRD tells the readers of the Patriot that he is opposed to the vote of the Dominion Government granting \$150,000 in bounties to encourage the sea fisheries. Mr. Laird holds "that it is each Province as a whole, and not merely the fishermen who are entitled to this money." Mr. Laird said bounties are most objectionable, and therefore the poor fishermen as a class have no right, in his estimation, to receive any special encouragement from the Dominion Government, by which to enable them to prosecute their uncertain and precarious business. What do the fishermen of P. E. Island think of Mr. Laird's doctrine as to the fisheries?

At the nine o'clock Mass, in St. Mary's Cathedral yesterday, the Rev. Dr. O'Brien, of Prince Edward Island, preached an eloquent sermon, during which he alluded to the sad affliction that had befallen the Catholics of the city and diocese of Halifax by the death of their Rev. Archbishop. He said that having occasion to travel in company with the deceased prelate during his journey to Rome last year, he could not help noticing the deep interest he took in the welfare of his flock, and of the marked respect paid to him, not only in Rome, but also in the other cities he had occasion to visit. The reverend Doctor paid a high tribute to the life and labors of His Grace, and said that Archbishop Hannan was held in deep veneration, not only by those of his flock, but by the community at large. At the eleven o'clock mass, the Rev. Father McGillivray, of Charlottetown, also took occasion to dwell upon the virtues so pre-eminently displayed in the life of the late Archbishop. The remarks of both preachers made a deep impression upon the hearers, and all who listened to the Rev. gentleman felt that their utterances fully portrayed the character and life of the prelate, whose earthly career has just been closed by a saintly death.—Herald, 24th.

THE Opposition are always boasting of the great success achieved at political meetings. To-day, as in 1878, their organs tell the country that the Liberal-Conservatives are losing ground in town and country. They inform the people of one section that the people of another section are opposed to the Government candidate. They brag about public meetings that have been held here and there, at all of which they claim the majority. These very same Opposition organs pursued this very same policy in 1878. The whole country, however, know full well that a terrible defeat was the result of all their bluster and brag at that time; and now, as then, the indications are that the Oppositionists will be routed, horse, foot and artillery.

The recollection of their past deeds of corruption and deception, their infamous "suspending account" and falsification of the public records of the country, whereby to delude, if possible, the people, and secure another lease of power, is still fresh in the memory of the taxpayers, who, as their betrayers full well knew, are now prepared to record their votes in favor of the present Government party—that party who, by honestly administering the affairs of the country and in every way possible, have reduced the salaries of officials, and curtailed unnecessary expenditure in the different departments of the public service, and have been enabled to remove the "tax curse," levied by their opponents. The conduct of the Opposition may well be likened unto that of the boy who, when passing a graveyard, whistled to keep his courage up.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner. OTTAWA, April 27. The prorogation is expected to take place about the 13th of May. A dissolution will follow by proclamation on the next Saturday. The elections will take place towards the end of June. This I have excellent authority for stating is the Government programme, and will be carried out unless something extraordinary occurs in the meantime.

LONDON, April 27. The marriage of Prince Leopold to Princess Helen, of Waldeck, took place at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, to-day. The marriage ceremony, which was conducted with great pomp, concluded shortly after one o'clock. The Archbishop of Canterbury was chief officiating clergyman. The Archbishop was assisted by the Bishops of London, Oxford, Worcester and Winchester and the Dean of Windsor. The Queen's arrival at the Chapel was announced by a flourish of trumpets.

Her Majesty wore the insignia of Prince Leopold and Kohinoor diamond. The bride and groom as follows:—Prince Leopold who had not entirely recovered from the effects of his recent accident, walked to the altar with the aid of a cane. Princess Helena was given away by her father. At the conclusion of the ceremony Prince Leopold kissed the bride, and the Queen kissed the newly married couple and father and mother of the Princess. The Prince of Wales and Duke of Connaught acted as best men for Prince Leopold. The Chapel was filled with a very brilliant assemblage of invited guests, among whom were Her Majesty's ministers with Mr. Gladstone at the head. Windsor is illuminated to-night, and a grand ball is in progress at the Town Hall.

Queen Victoria, yesterday, invested the King of Netherlands with the Order of the Garter. Princess Louise will return to Canada about the middle of May.

Boston, April 27. Ralph Waldo Emerson, poet, died at his home, Concord, Mass., at nine o'clock to-night, aged seventy-nine years.

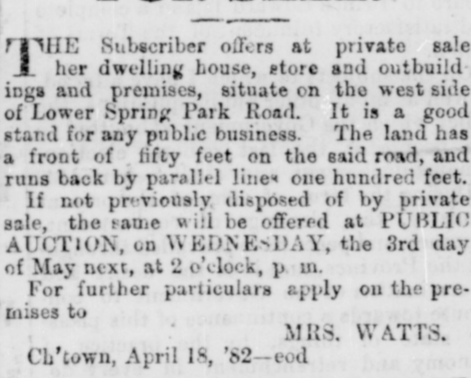
