

BYC And Dairymen Win Softball League Games

The Sunshine Island Dairy and the Basileia Youth Club continued their onward marches in the City Softball League yesterday evening by defeating the Guardian Angels and the Bowery Bombers.

The Dairymen defeated the Bombers by a 9-5 score in a well played game on the Parkdale Diamond while the BYC outscored the Angels 20-17 in a game on the Knights Diamond.

The win was the tenth in a row for the League leading Dairymen who now have a total of 20 points, six more than the second place B.Y.C. and L.Y.C.

Ced Ballem pitched a seven hitter in hurling the Milkmen to victory. He struck out four men and walked one. Rival pitcher Jim Hughes of the Bombers was relieved by Mike Connolly in the sixth inning and between them they gave up eight hits.

Both pitchers Ballem and Hughes hit triples to aid their own causes. Finer Mahan of the Bombers had two hits in three trips and Cliff Jackson of the Dairy had two hits.

Tiger Bradley of the Bombers pulled off the best fielding play of the game as he raced in behind second base to grab a shoestring catch off Jackie Turner in the fourth.

The B.Y.C.-Angels game was a slug-fest as the batters on both teams combined for a total of 33 hits. The B.Y.C. got 16 hits of Dick Doyle while the Angels got 17 off Wally Sheppard.

The Angels raced into a 7-0 lead in the second inning but saw the B.Y.C. go ahead 16-11 in the fifth.

hits each with one of Joseph's hits being a two run homer in the fifth inning.

Reg Hughes led the Angels with four hits. Billy Wright of the Angels hit a two run homer in the sixth.

Charlie Weatherbie of the B.Y.C. pulled off the outstanding fielding play of the game as he raced into deep short to make an over the shoulder catch off George Schleyer.

Reg Hughes, Frank Hughes and Merle Longaphie of the Angels pulled off a snappy double play in the second inning.

cial ones dealing with the establishment of a marine slip in the city to provide needed employment. It was noted in the resolution passed that the Provincial Government had either taken no necessary steps towards this end or if it had failed to acquaint the public with results. Another important one dealt with the need for extension of the runways at the airport to permit the landing and taking off of large planes.

Other resolutions dealt with greater compensation to teachers of the Province, actual assistance to lobster fishermen rather than loans, improvement in the ferry services between here and the mainland, the laying of heavy paving rather than the light variety.

Lower Price Spreads

The annual meeting also suggested that efforts be made to spread lower prices over all industries rather than permit a decline in farm produce alone; they also believed that a greater effort should be made by the Government to induce the growing and processing of vegetables here instead of sending Island vegetables to Nova Scotia for canning.

Rural electrification on an expanded scale was asked and it was suggested that a Provincial agricultural College be established and greater finances allocated to the Experimental Station here for purposes of research.

Formal resolutions affirmed loyalty to Her Majesty, the leader in Federal politics of Hon. George Drew and Provincially of Mr. R. R. Bell.

Rally Held

The opening guns in the Federal election campaign here in the local Progressive Conservative candidates were fired last night at a rally at the Community Centre sponsored by the Young Progressive Conservatives following their annual meeting held in the afternoon.

It was presided over by Mr. W. C. S. MacDonald, Summerside, who presented the various members of the Y. P. C. who introduced the guest speakers. Mr. MacDonald himself introduced Mr. R. R. Bell, Provincial leader. Brigadier John Price, candidate in Prince County was not present but wrote to the president expressing his regrets at his inability to be here at this time. He also pledged himself to full support of the Conservative Party's election manifesto.

The senior member of Queens, Mr. W. C. S. MacLure, was introduced by Mr. Bennett Carr. The speaker attacked the present taxation policy in his brief address. Mr. Gerald Foster introduced Mr. Angus MacLean, M. P. for Queens, who stated that people in Canada today were spending more of their income in taxes than they were on food. He also called for decentralization of industry.

Major John A. MacDonald M.L.A. and the candidate for Kings County, was introduced by Mr. George Wright, Montague. Major MacDonald referred to the famous Currie Report to emphasize the cost to taxpayers of unusual outlays of funds. Mr. Bell also referred to this report and to expenditures ranging from teapots to neckties. He regretted that the Governments of the Province and Canada had not seen fit to give aid to the lobster fishermen. Instead of a loan which he said was proposed to help people already in debt.

Marlene Stewart In Finals For Golf Title

PORTHAWL, Wales (CP) — Marlene Stewart, the 19-year-old Canadian girl who "doesn't make mistakes," shot deadly efficient golf to move into the finals of the British women's open amateur golf championship.

The little Porthawl, Ont., girl Wednesday downed English and Scots opposition to advance to the 33-hole final today against Ireland's Philomena Garvey.

"She has a very good chance of winning," veteran Ada MacKenzie of Toronto said after Marlene reached the finals with a one-up victory over Jean Donald, Scots internationalist, at the Royal Porthcawl links.

"She played wonderful golf today—all-round golf," added Miss MacKenzie. "She just never lets her opponents get ahead. She doesn't make mistakes."

Her semi-final match against Miss Donald exemplified the type of game newspapers here have dubbed "machine golf."

Miss Stewart, only survivor of seven Canadian players in this major British sporting event, starts play at 10 a.m. for the 36-hole, one-day final.

Donor of Walker Golf Cup Dies

NEW YORK, (AP)—George H. Walker, 78, investment banker and donor of the Walker Cup in British-American amateur golf competition, died Wednesday. The sports trophy named for him was placed in competition in 1920 while Walker was president of the U.S. Golf Association.

Begin Stadium For Empire Games

VANCOUVER, (CP) — Canada's largest sports stadium was "officially" started Wednesday with a single spadeful of earth dug in a colorful ceremony.

Percy Williams, a Canadian Olympic sport star of 1928, cut the rich green sod of a former golf course to begin the 36,000-seat stadium being built for the 1954 British Empire Games.

To cost \$1,250,000, the stadium is 3 3/4 miles east of the downtown business district at Exhibition Park.

Jack Ready Leads Island League Batting Race

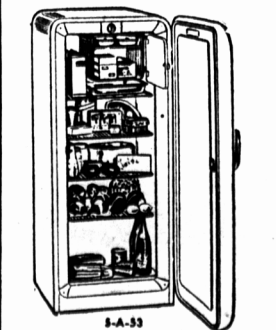
