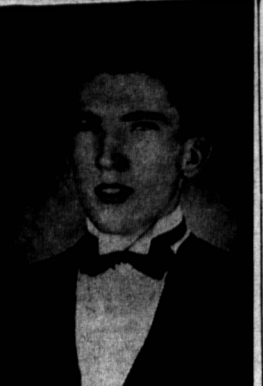


NORMAN S. STEWART

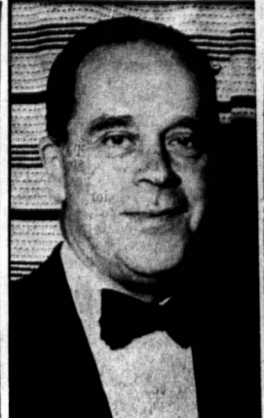
NORMAN W. SHEIDOW

HALIFAX (CP)—Rear-Admiral S. V. Storbhelli, Norwegian naval attaché to Canada, said here Tuesday Canada's anti-submarine defences are the most modern in the world. He referred to HMCS Ottawa, this country's latest sub chaser, as "a grim adversary for any underwater foe." Admiral Storbhelli is senior officer of a 30-man contingent of Commonwealth and foreign service attaches on a tour of Nova Scotia. They arrived late Monday and toured naval ships and installations here Tuesday. Today they leave for the Greenwood RCAF air base and the navy training centre at Cornwallis.



Prof. H.F. Sipprell Adjudicates At Drama Festival

The Prince Edward Island Drama Festival Association consider that they have been highly favored to have secured once again the services of Professor H. F. Sipprell, Drama Advisor at Acadia University, as adjudicator of this year's festival. Mr. Sipprell commenced his duties last night at St. Peter's Hall, Charlottetown where three plays were presented for adjudication. Professor Sipprell took his B.A. degree at Acadia University, and his M.A. at Harvard, studied play production at Harvard and at Citzens' House, Bath, England; Shakespeare Memorial Theatre and Shakespeare Hostler, Stratford-on-Avon, England. Since 1939 Professor Sipprell has been a member of the Faculty of the Department of English at Acadia University, producer of the Acadia Arena, etc. He also produced an extensive list of plays of all types including a series of 19 Shakespearean plays, a touring group, which played in some fifty Scotia. Professor Sipprell organized the first course in play productions (University Grade) in the Maritimes, and offered the course every second year at Acadia University. As a special lecturer of short courses under auspices of the New Brunswick Division of Recreation and Physical Fitness, and the Nova Scotia Department of Adult Education, and at the School of Community Art at Tatamagouche, N.S. Professor Sipprell has made a great contribution to art in the Maritimes. In recognition of Prof. Sipprell's outstanding contributions to drama in the Maritime Provinces, he was awarded the

Reading Institutes For PEI Teachers Under Way

Courses on the teaching of reading to children of primary and intermediate grades are now in progress in the province. These institutes, conducted by Miss Kathryn McCulley, B. Sc. of Charlottetown, include demonstration lessons as well as instruction and discussion on the various problems in connection with the teaching of this most important basic subject, and are provided as a service by the W.J. Gage company of Toronto, publishers of the readers used in the first four grades, similar demonstrations were given in this province by Miss McCulley four years ago. Teachers generally are enthusiastic over the programme.
