A Halifax paper says:—During the past few days there has been in the city a gentleman from New York who is said to be a millionaire and who is classed as one of the leading real estate dealers in that city. He did not let it be generally known that the object of his visit was other than pleasure, but an Echo reporter learned that it combined business. "W. C. D." Objects. Sir: In an editorial of your issue of 4th inst., you say:—"Again it was contended that the Governor-General would not repeal the Scott Act until some law was passed to take its place, and even 'W. C. D.' wrote home to the Examiner assuring the electors that His Excellency would exercise his discretionary powers to their benefit in the matter."

Will you kindly allow me to say that neither the Examiner nor any other paper published a letter from W. C. D. containing such an assurance, assumption, opinion, or whatever you may call it, or any language that could be so construed.

[The best reply we can give W. C. D. is to quote his words exactly as they appeared in the Examiner. If they place him in any better light as a prophet and an authority on constitutional law than our remarks did, he is quite welcome to their support. He said:—"Before I close I think it well to correct a prevalent misapprehension, that if the Scott Act be defeated, your city will have no law of any kind until the legislature makes a new enactment. This is a device of the supporters of the Scott Act which was used at the last election. The Scott Act is not abrogated by the simple vote of the citizens, but only by a proclamation by the governor-general in council declaring that from and after a certain date, its provisions will no longer be in force. There is no fear of the Minister of justice issuing the issue of such a proclamation until a law has been provided to take the place of that defeated. The press should make this plain and not allow the people to be deceived by such plausible subtleties."

Was it a plausible subterfuge?—Ed. GUAR.

Petition to Rev. Crawford Frost. The Rev. Crawford Frost, incumbent of St. George's church, New Glasgow, N. S., and formerly curate of St. Paul's, Charlottetown, having intimated to his congregation his intention of tendering to them his resignation on August 1st, a petition has been presented to him, the substance of which we give below, from the New Glasgow Enterprise. The petition has over thirty signatures affixed.

Rev. and Dear Sir,—In your sermon on Sunday 14th, you intimated you had been called to a higher work, viz. Christian Unity, and therefore your resignation would take place on August 1st. We, your parishioners feel that St. George's parish would receive a lasting injury by your leaving us, and we trust therefore that you will reconsider your resignation and consent to remain with us. Should you comply with our request, resolved that we will give you our hearty support in all matters furthering the good of the church and cause of Christ.

Respectfully Yours, Meeting of the City Council. The City Council met last evening. Those present were, His Worship the Mayor, His Honor Recorder Fitz Gerald, and Councillors Morris, Byrne, Hughes, Crabbe, Beer, Douse, Horne, Eden, McCarron, Taylor (10).

A communication was read by the Mayor from the water works commissioners, praying for the issue of debentures, to the amount of \$5,000.

It was moved by Coun. Morris, seconded by Coun. Byrne and carried, that a prayer of the petition be granted. A memorial from the Charlottetown Fire Insurance Co. praying that they be exempted from the customary tax on insurance companies as they have saved the citizens a considerable sum of money, while the other companies, had neglected contrary to promise, to reduce the rates of insurance.

They believed that as the company was for the protection of the citizens and not for the purpose of making money as all other Foreign Insurance Companies are, the city should help them in this way.

His Honor the Recorder said that the City Council had no authority whatever to take the tax off any property. This memorial was ordered to lie on the table.

A memorial from the Charlottetown Rifle Association asking for a grant of money to help along the prize list of the Association was read.

Councillor Morris said that he was in favor of voting a sum for that purpose. He moved the adjournment of the meeting until Wednesday the 19th at 7.30 p.m. It was seconded by Councillor Taylor and carried.

Senate Committee Meeting. OTTAWA, Aug. 10.—The Senate committee met this afternoon to investigate the Bay des Chaleurs Railway Bill, but none of the witnesses put in appearance, and chairman Vidal had to state that he did not think that the committee was going the right way about the matter. It will be taken up again on Wednesday next.

Peltit Wins. NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Tom Peltit, American champion, defeated Brookes the Canadian champion, three straight games. He outplayed him at every point.

Quarrels over Whiskey. ST. LOUIS, Aug. 10.—At Alanthur, Montana, Frank Caffey and several others quarrelled over some whiskey and a general fight ensued. Caffey was shot dead, and another man was fatally wounded.

Railway Disaster. NEW HAVEN, CONN., Aug. 10.—The caboose at the end of a gravel train was struck by a freight train. The engineer and nine Italians were seriously wounded, two fatally.

New Minister Appointed. WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The President has appointed Richard Coats Shannon, of New York, minister to the new field of Nicaragua Costa Rica and San Salvador.

Minister Resigned. WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Fred Douglass has resigned the position of minister to Hayti.

Hot Weather. NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The weather here to-day was excessively warm. Four deaths from sun stroke occurred.

Father Chiniqu Assaulted. ESCANABA, Mich., Aug. 6.—Father Chiniquy was struck on the head last evening when on his way to the Opera House to lecture on "Auricular Confession." The man who struck him was shot at. Father Chiniquy rested quite well during the night. The excitement over the murderous assault is very great.

ESCANABA, Mich., Aug. 7.—Father Chiniquy has recovered from the assault upon him sufficiently to resume lecturing. Shooting and rioting still continue. The state has been called on for protection.
