Restaurant Supervisor Retires From Abbie

BORDEN. (Special) — Francis W. Westhaver, a man well-known to thousands of Prince Edward Islanders and summer visitors, has retired from his post as restaurant supervisor aboard the Canadian National ferry Abegweit.

Mr. Westhaver, who is also town clerk of Borden, made his first working trip across the Northumberland Strait in 1931 aboard the ferry Charlotte. His retirement this week marked the end of a 39-year career in catering aboard CN ships and trains.

A native of Hubbards, N.S., Mr. Westhaver joined CN in Halifax as a cook with the sleeping, dining and parlor car department. From 1926 to 1931 he served on such luxury trains as the Ocean Limited and Maritime Express, turning out thousands of appetizing meals from the tiny, swaying kitchen of a railway dining car. He rose through the posts of third cook, second cook and buffet cook before leaving for the P.E.I. ferries in 1931.

Aboard the Charlotte the kitchen was larger — but just as liable to unexpected movements. Mr. Westhaver was promoted lunch counter steward in 1934, and restaurant supervisor in 1948. He served on both the Prince Edward Island and the Abegweit.

For many visitors to the Island their meal aboard the ferry — often their first meal at sea — is a memorable part of their trip. Many remember Mr. Westhaver as the man who presided over the meal, making sure that the food and service were of the best.

When Mr. Westhaver retired this week tribute was paid to his work by J.G. Phelan, superintendent of the Atlantic ferry sleeping, dining and parlor car department. A farewell gift was presented to Mr. Westhaver by Mr. Phelan on behalf of fellow employees.

Mr. Westhaver plans to spend his retirement in Borden, and continue with his duties as town clerk. He hopes to find more time for his favorite sport, fishing.

Mrs. Westhaver is the former Anna May McLellan of Cape Breton.

No Immediate Change Due For College

Prince of Wales College will not become a degree-granting university in 1965. Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, said in the Legislature last night.

During House consideration of the spending estimates of the department of education for the 1965-66 fiscal year, A.W. Matheson (L-4th Kings) asked whether or not the government had "any overall plan for Prince of Wales College."

Dr. Dewar said the government has under study the report of the royal commission on higher education and the future of the college is "a matter of government policy that has not yet been definitely decided."

He said the college won't be a degree-granting institution this year "I better quality that," he said, "by saving we won't grant degrees this year."

(Continued from page one) first time by the Germans against Canadian troops at Ypres April 22, 1915 — one month less than 50 years ago. Some 2,000 Canadians died in this first use of the horror weapon.

In answer to a question by Sir Alec Douglas Home, Wilson said "as far as he knows only tear gas — not a fatal variety — was used in Viet Nam and this did not infringe international law."

Wilson seemed more concerned about a reported statement by Gen. Maxwell Taylor, U.S. ambassador to South Viet Nam, that "there are no limits" to the escalation that might be reached in the Viet Nam fighting.

"This is a question on which we must seek further elucidation — and are doing so," said Wilson. "I think this goes considerably further than anything I have told the House. I think

20 PC Tax Increase Possible In Montague

MONTAGUE — A tax increase of upwards of 20 per cent may be necessary to carry on the business of the town of Montague for the next year. This opinion was expressed in general by council members following a study of the budget at the continued monthly meeting held Monday evening in the council chambers.

The meeting was necessary to conclude departmental budgets most of which were presented at the regular monthly meeting. It is now agreed the town will need a budget of \$36,520 to carry on the business and program of each departmental budget. This is about \$4,000 over 1964.

The new budget includes such amounts as \$1,600 for the fire brigade; \$950 for tourism and industrial promotion; \$6,400 for sanitation which also includes an incinerator building at the dump and an operator; \$1,000 for operation of new hockey rink; \$5,600 for general government, and other departments.

An increase of 20 per cent would give the town approximately \$3,200 and with all things being considered could leave the town with a balanced budget for 1965.

MOVE REGRETTED All councillors expressed regret at having to increase taxes but stated the total revenue was not enough to supply all the services demanded by the taxpayers who would have to pay for all the services they desire.

No decision was reached on the amount of increase as the assessment figures for the year are still not complete. The rate will be set as soon as the assessment figures are received.

The second item on the agenda was out of town fire calls. Following some discussion it was agreed that the crash truck would be made available to the firemen who would operate this vehicle with a crew of four men independent of the town council for out of town fires within a radius of approximately five miles of Montague. Each district would be asked to pay \$3 per home to qualify for this service. Any surplus funds would be used to supply more modern equipment. Firemen working on such fires would be paid from this fund for their time. A committee has been set up to look into the matter and is to report its findings as soon as possible.

ONUS ON AREA

At the present time no fire vehicle is allowed to leave the town limits as all equipment is the property of the taxpayers of the town and not the district. This program is out of town assistance is being done by the fire brigade on a volunteer basis and districts wishing to take advantage of it within an area designated may do so if the whole community participates. If not the firemen feel they have done everything under the circumstances to assist their area neighbors and the onus is on the area and not the town of Montague or its fire brigade.

Central Queens Home, School Plans May Variety Concert

At the March meeting of Central Queens Regional High School Home and School Association members planned to have a variety concert in the school auditorium the first Friday night in May.

Each district in the area will provide one number for the program, and a one-act play, which will be presented at the Drama Festival, will also be presented.

The 1967 National Centennial project was discussed and members voted individually, choosing "The Childrens Reading Promotion," first "Study Conference," second and "Canadian Indians" third. A motion was made to send \$19.67 for this project.

A letter was read from M.F. Hazen, provincial president, asking members to attend a meeting arranged by the provincial executive. Several members volunteered to attend.

A film "Family Circle" was viewed after which members divided into groups for discussion, the highlights were then brought back by Mrs. David Andrews and Morris MacIntyre. The president, Sterling Campbell, who presided at the meeting, introduced a "question box" and asked members to place questions in it at any time.

Mrs. Jennie Bernard, secretary, read the minutes of the previous meeting and called the roll which was answered by 25 members.

Lunch was served.

Members of parliament from the Island and other interested guests have been invited to the showing.

Commenting on it, Heath Macquarrie, MP for Queens and a member of the centennial committee in his home town of Victoria, said he was very pleased that the film was to be shown. "The P.E.I. celebrations of the centennial and the Charlottetown conference was an outstanding success. If the national event in 1967 is as well planned and executed, Canadians will have every reason for pride and satisfaction," Mr. Macquarrie commented.

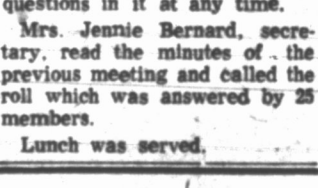
The film is to be shown over the CBC-TV network this coming Sunday.

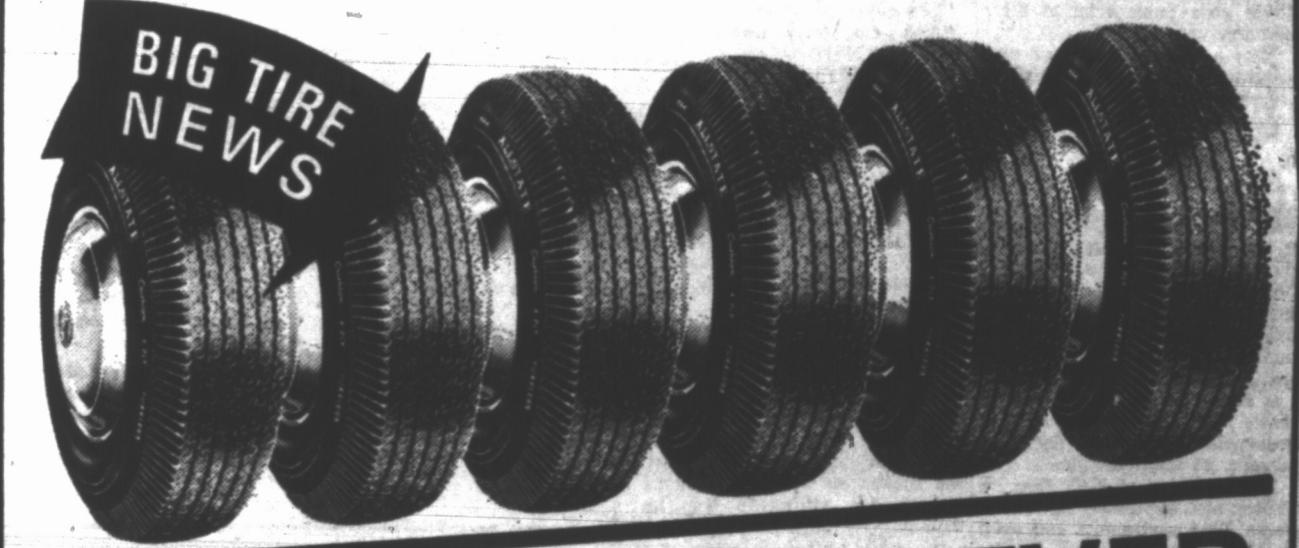
