September Fish Catch Reported Over Average

Total fish landings in the Maritimes during September, 1965 amounted to 121,600,000 pounds valued at \$5,300,000. These totals included 46,000,000 pounds of groundfish valued at \$2,000,000, 66,500,000 pounds of pelagic and estuarial species valued at \$1,400,000 and 4,500,000 pounds of shellfish valued at \$1,900,000 dollars. In comparison with the average September catch during the years 1962 to 1964, the month's total catch was above average by 23,800,000 pounds and \$218,000.

000. Groundfish landings for September were above the average September catch during the years 1962 to 1964 by 1,300,000 pounds and \$142,000. The month's pelagic catch was above the three-year September average by 23,000,000 pounds and \$1,600,000. Shellfish landings for September were 463,000 pounds and \$31,000 below the September 1962 to 1964 average. **LOBSTER DECLINE** The increased groundfish catch during September was due to larger than normal landings of redfish and flatfishes. The larger than normal pelagic landings for September were

the result of increased herring landings during the month. The lobster catch mainly accounted for the decreased shellfish landings for September, compared with the previous three years. Cumulative fish landings in the Maritimes for the first nine months of 1965 amounted to 748,500,000 pounds, valued at \$50,000,000. The figures for the similar period of 1964 were 837,300,000 million pounds valued at \$43,900,000 and for 1963 were 556,600,000 pounds valued at \$38,400,000. A death toll of 8,000, the largest in history, is expected on Britain's roads in 1965.

Premier Shaw Favors Free Trading Prospect

Premier Walter R. Shaw commenting on the suggestion of a free trade area composed of the Atlantic Provinces and New England said, "I would favour the prospects of an area of this kind." "The matter may very well receive study and investigation at the Atlantic Premiers Conference to be held sometime in November at Charlottetown. "Just how an area of this kind could be established, with special trading regulations, within the political boundaries of Canada and the United States will make an interesting study. "What may come out of such a study would be difficult to state," said Premier Shaw, "possibly no province would be in a better position to avail itself of the New England market than P.E.I." The suggestion of the free trade area composed of these regions is not new, but it was brought up again by John J. McCarthy, commissioner of administration of Massachusetts, in a speech to the combined Boards of Trade of the Annapolis Valley in Kentville on Saturday evening. **RECOMMEND STUDY** Mr. McCarthy said he would recommend to Governor Volpe of Massachusetts the organization of a study committee representing the Massachusetts and Nova Scotia governments and chambers of commerce in the state and province. Other states and provinces in the two adjoining regions would join in the study, he hoped. Yesterday Premier Robert Stanfield of Nova Scotia said he would be happy to co-operate in

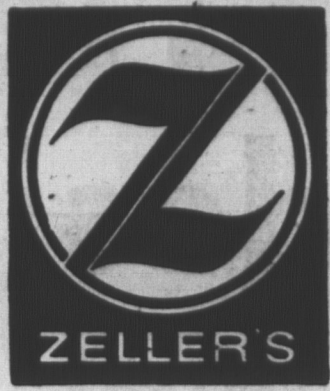


MR. KIPPING such a study of prospects for a free trade area. Eric Kipping, vice-president of APEC and general manager of the Charlottetown Board of Trade said, "we would welcome freer trade." "When the Maritimes were prosperous it was in the last century when they utilized the natural trading area of the Atlantic seaboard." He said that recently a meeting to discuss the possibility of a free trade area between a dozen business men and APEC officials from the Atlantic province met 20 members of the New England Council to "explore investment and development possibilities." The idea of a joint development or credit corporation was proposed at these meetings. Mr. Kipping also said, "in the Maritime area we have traditionally suffered from tariffs and this proposal of a free trade zone if implemented would relieve this problem."

Little York Cow Is Breed Leader

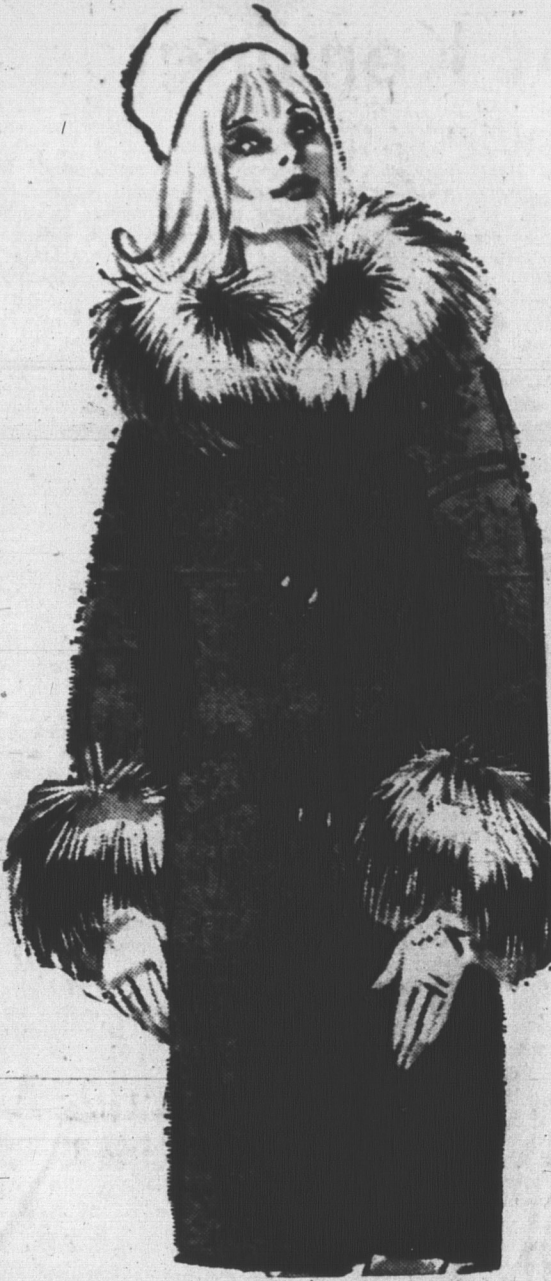
Glenholm Linda Lou, a senior four-year old cow owned by Almon Wood and Sons, Little York, was a Canadian class leader for production in the Yorkshire breed for the period covered by the current Ayrshire Review. Linda Lou produced 14,357 pounds of milk for a breed class average — a comparison with other cows in her class across Canada — of 171 per cent in milk and 173 per cent in butterfat. Raedale Classic Norma Jean, a senior two-year-old heifer, produced 9,432 pounds milk, with BCAs of 129 milk and 134 in butterfat for Andrew B. and Fred T. MacRae, Charlottetown RR. Glengarry Captain Shirley's Model produced 9,626 pounds milk, with BCAs of 134 milk, 127 butterfat for A. MacRae and J. Son, Sherwood. She is also a senior 2-year-old heifer.
