

B.Y.C. Forces 7th Game

F. Shepherd Scores Winner In Sudden-Death Overtime

Frank Shepherd's goal at 14 minutes and 30 seconds of sudden-death overtime hockey gave the Baseline Youth Club a 6-5 victory over Parkdale Flyers at the Sports Arena last night and forced a seventh and deciding game in the Island League semi-final Thursday night.

Shepherd's goal, which was scored on a long screen shot from inside the blue line, climaxed a tremendous comeback drive by the B.Y.C. The Flyers took a 2-0 early in the first period and were leading 5-2 going into the third. Three straight goals in the third sent the game in overtime and after battling through a 10-minute scoreless session, Shepherd ended the drama with his tricky drive that Roper had a pad on but trickled into the corner of the net.

Shepherd also won for himself a handful of prizes donated by business firms as the game went into the first overtime period. The young B.Y.C. defenceman will receive 23 dollars in cash, a 14 dollar shirt and two ringside seats to the first boxing match at the Arena. Spy Ready and Buck Whitlock who assisted on the goal will share 5 dollars in taxi service, and 5 dollars worth of groceries and a 75-dollar certificate in the purchase of a new vacuum cleaner. Thane Doyle also won himself a shirt as the winning goalie.

DRAMATIC GAME
It was a game packed with drama and had the tremendous crowd of fans numbering in the vicinity of 2,000 sitting on the edge of their seats throughout. It looked like curtains for B.Y.C. when the Flyers moved to their big 3 goal lead in the second, but the youth club, getting better and better as the game wore on and backed up with some superlative puck-stopping by goaltender Thane Doyle, pulled the game out of the fire.

Roy (Buck, Shady) Whitlock, rammed home three big goals for the B.Y.C. and set up two others. Merrill Pineau scored the fourth B.Y.C. goal and it was Johnny Squarebriggs' marker with a little more than 2 minutes to play in the third that sent that game into overtime.

Orin Carver played a brilliant game for the Flyers and threw in 3 of their goals in the bargain. Bob Hurry and Jim MacLeod notched the others.

CLEAN GAME
The players stuck strictly to fast, exciting crowd-pleasing hockey through and referees Jack Kane and Don Whelan had to call only one penalty, that went to Kip Ready of Parkdale for pulling down cousin Jack Ready in the second period. The penalty didn't figure in the scoring.

Thane Doyle held the youth club together in the first two periods with some dazzling saves. Parkdale had much of the territorial play in the first forty minutes and the youth club was lucky to be trailing only 5-2 at the end of the second.

Flyers wheeled in 2 goals in the first 8 minutes of play. Orin Carver triggered the first when his backhand drive from close in beat Doyle cleanly. Jim MacLeod got the next from about 15 feet out when he had a direct shot on the net. He was helped in the play by Gerald Cruys and Bob Hurry.

Buck Whitlock cut the lead in half at 13:25 of the period when he gofied Jack Burke's passout behind Roper.

Before the 10 minute mark of the second period was reached the Flyers built their lead up to 4-1 as Orin Carver got his second on a beautiful rink length rush and Bob Hurry connected as he rode right in on Doyle.

Whitlock drilled his second goal right through Roper's pads with

Pineau and Ready helping him out, but at 17:56 Orin Carver rammed home his third of the night and seemed to wrap up the game and the series.

TIDE TURNS
The tide of battle took a drastic turn in the third as the Flyers seemed to tire much more quickly than the youth clubbers. Only 3 minutes and 13 seconds had elapsed when Whitlock batted in his third straight goal on a neat solo effort and at 13:57 Merrill Pineau had an open corner glaring at him after picking up Whitlock's passout and made no mistake.

At 17:53 Lloyd Shepherd engineered the tying goal when he carried the puck the length of the ice and slipped a drop pass to Squarebriggs who was moving up fast. Using Shepherd as a blind Squarebriggs coasted right in on Roper's doorstep before letting go the tying goal.

In the 10-minute overtime period Willie Dunn had two great chances to score but was foiled by Doyle on his first try and couldn't control the puck when he was in alone the second time. However had the best chance for the B.Y.C. when he burst around the Parkdale defence with a great drive but saw his shot go wide by inches. In the sudden-death overtime neither team took any chances. Gerald Cruys almost notched he winner when his shot bounced off Doyle's pads and landed on top of the net.

CHATTER . . . We wouldn't be at all surprised to see them hanging from the rafters on Thursday when the seventh and final game of this series is played. That marked the fourth straight overtime game in this series and is a solid indication that there isn't much to loose between the youth club and Parkdale. . . Erland Wood unleashed the hardest check of the entire season when he caught Frank Shepherd looking the other way in the second. Wood hit Shepherd low the B.Y.C. player turned a complete somersault. . . Buck Whitlock got out on the head in the overtime but returned to action after a few minutes getting repairs. . . that is Thursday night for the final. . . Better get your tickets early or be out in the cold.

Canadiens Trim N.Y. Rangers 3-1

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens packed all their scoring into four minutes of the final period Tuesday night to defeat New York Rangers 3-1 and take a 3-1 lead in their best-of-seven Stanley Cup semifinal series.

Henri Richard's goal, scored on the rebound of Dickie Moore's shot, proved to be the breaker.

For two periods and well on into the third the Rangers showed a surprising reversal of the form they displayed Saturday when they were bowled over 8-3. Andy Heberton was credited with a first-period goal when Bill Gadsby's shot went in off the New York winger and from then until they were finally overpowered in the third period, the Rangers played a clever checking game, blocking nicely within their own area and getting great support from goalie Lorne Worsley.

DEFLECTION SHOT
It was a deflection goal also that tied the count. Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion's drive clipping Ranger forward Dean Prentice and going into the net from a few feet out.

After Henri Richard had supplied the winning goal, rookie Phil Goyette lifted in a backhand shot that left the Rangers in dire straits. Montreal kept up a steady fire on Worsley throughout the game.

For the whole game Canadiens outshot the Rangers 40-31. Nine penalties were called by referee Frank Givray, five against the Rangers. The nine included major penalties to Tom Johnson of Montreal and Andy Bathgate for fighting in the second period.

Playing cagily, Rangers went in front at 6:42 of the first period when Gadsby wound up at the blue line with a booming drive and the puck, striking Heberton, whizzed past goalie Jacques Plante. Both Heberton and Red

Sullivan had great chances in the second period to give Rangers a wider lead but both missed the net. Sullivan was only 10 feet out but his drive was three feet wide.

DEFENCE WEAKENED
Rangers' defensive work inside their blue line began to weaken in the third period and Canadiens were given more leeway, roaming about and trying to set up plays.

The tying goal came at 9:22. Geoffrion drilling a screened shot from 30 feet out and the puck caroming into the net off Prentice's body.

Canadiens were quick to jump into the lead. Moore drilled an angle shot that sent Worsley to the ice to block it but Henri Richard calmly lifted the puck over the goalie at 11:28.

A long lateral pass by Bob Turner to Goyette set up the final goal at 13:08. The Rangers evidently were looking for another pass buy Goyette calmly wheeled around defenceman Jack Eves and let go a backhand to the far corner of the net.

The fifth game of the series will be played here Thursday. Tuesday night's crowd was 14,091.

Simmons Blanks Red Wings 2-0

BOSTON (AP)—Rookie goalie Don Simmons blanked goals by Real Chevrefils and Vic Stastuk in a masterful shutout that carried Boston to a 2-0 victory over Detroit Tuesday night and a bulging 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven series.

Simmons, the icy-nerved 25-year-old defender who turned in two of his four regular season shutouts against the Red Wings in 25 games, made 20 saves in a great performance.

A capacity Boston Garden throng of 13,900 watched Simmons foil Red Wings ace Gordie Howe in the second period with the score 1-0 to highlight his efforts.

Bouncing back from his seven-goal shelling in the second game of this semi-final series, Simmons received bone-rattling support throughout the contest—particularly from defencemen Fernie Flaman and Bob Armstrong.

The entire Boston club checked so closely and so hard the Wings were a beaten team after Simmons checked Howe's solo flight.

Chevrefils, a 31-goal scorer for the Bruins this season, who was traded back from Detroit to Boston in 1956, completed a perfect play to put his team ahead 1-0 in the sixth minute of play.

Boston was bringing the puck down the ice when defenceman Leo Boivin of the Bruins swiped it at an angle across the ice toward the Detroit blue line.

Fleming Mackell, skating toward the bench after a penalty-killing tour, picked it up and passed the 10 ft slide. He passed backwards to Chevrefils who was trailing and took out a defenceman.

Chevrefils, cutting sharply to his right, fired a 10 foot backhand as he crossed in front of the net.

Boston's jarring play enabled them to hang on to the slim margin until Stastuk's goal at 5:43 of the final period.

Stastuk picked up his own rebound on a 25-footer which Detroit goalie Glen Hall stopped neatly.

There is no definite date set as yet but the series will likely be getting underway at Fairview Saturday night with the return game or games at the Arena next week.

WE SHARED some of the disappointment of many of the fans at the showing of the Abbies at the Arena Saturday. Coach Norman Larter wasn't too well pleased either, but believes that the will regain the form displayed in Campbellton a week ago when they trimmed the Tigers 8-4. Abbies were not finishing off their plays as well as they have in the past on Saturday and were not driving with the zest shown in former games.
