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developed and the most prosperous part of Africa at present. SIEGE UNLIKELY
There seems little chance that black Africa could storm this southern fortress successfully in the near future. Portugal has more than 100,000 troops in Angola and Mozambique. South Africa could put 250,000 men in the field. Rhodesia has a small, well trained army of perhaps 10,000 men.

When Prime Minister Smith told the Rhodesian people they have been called on to "play a role of worldwide significance," he referred to the keen interest he has shown in Africa.
"The decision which we have taken today is a refusal by Rhodesians to call their birthright and, even if we were to surrender, does anyone believe that Rhodesia would be the last target of the Communists and the African-Asian bloc?" Smith asked.
Rhodesia now is expected to tighten ideological bonds with neighboring South Africa and Mozambique, and with Angola. The enthusiastic response in the South African Parliament to the declaration of independence indicates the warm south Africans feel for the northern neighbor and buffer.
The Rhodesian army is deployed along the northern border with Zambia, but there is no expectation of real trouble in this region immediately. White Rhodesians now feel

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they can count on South Africa if it does develop.
The apathetic way in which the Negroes in Rhodesia received the word of independence strengthened in feeling of white security here.
Chapman, one of the 15 non-government members of the Rhodesian Parliament whose role is more visible than effective, said:
"Only the highly sophisticated Africans (Negroes) really understand what has happened."
He said that when word moves along the bush telegraph, "trouble might start in some very isolated spot and could spark trouble." But the Rhodesian police are efficient.
Chapman was not clear as to what the 14 Negro members, elected on a so-called B-roll in the 65-member Parliament, would do about independence. Smith intends to bring the traditional tribal chiefs into the government.
One disturbing element of the declaration was the immediate installation of censorship on the Rhodesian press. Censors moved into the newspapers soon after the declaration and refused to permit publication of the proclamation issued by British Governor Sir Humphrey Gibbs. It was not mentioned in the government-controlled radio. Additionally, normal news channels have closed.

Albertan Wins Wheat Ch'ship

TORONTO (CP) — Albertans are showing their oats—especially when it comes to walking off with world wheat championships.
Larry C. Hix, a 20-year-old farmer from Belseler, Alta., 20 miles northeast of Calgary, was awarded the wheat crown with a sample of the Chinook variety at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.
The 1964 title went to 19-year-old Larry Gibson of Carbon, Alta., also with a Chinook sample.
The major awards were divided mainly between western Canada and Ontario.
The international award for seed potatoes was won by Tona Hama of Ramier, Alta., with a sample of the netted gem variety. Second was Gerald Truman of Amherst, N.S.
