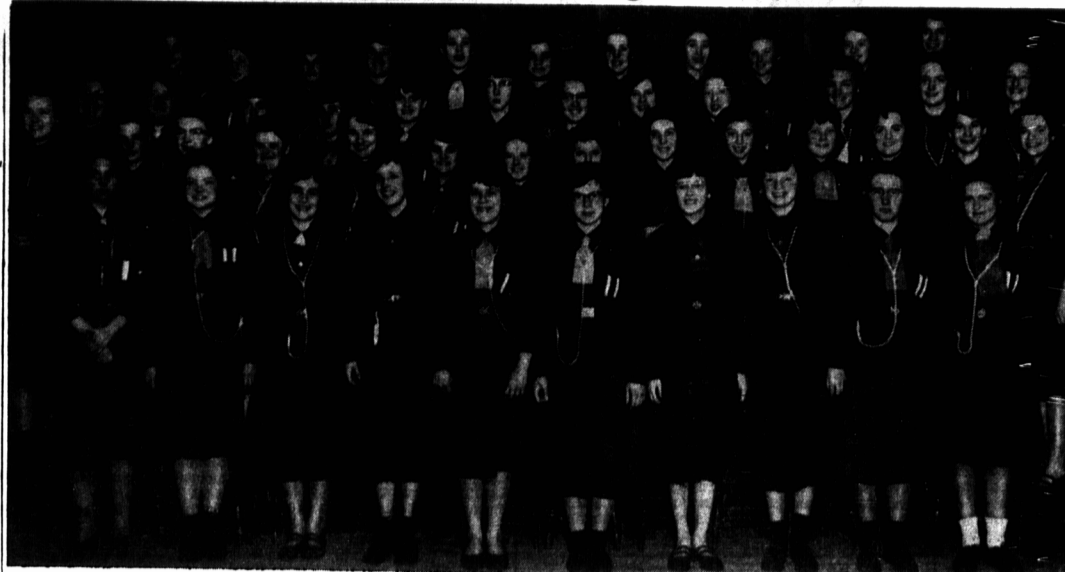

### Defend Spelling Used By Yanks

LONDON (Reuters)—Americans often accused here of murdering the King's English, have been rebuffed by two letter writers—one British and one American. Both of them write in the staid Daily Telegraph that the first murderous assaults on the language were made long ago by Britons themselves. The writers replied to complaints about the "vicious practice" of using American spelling, made in a recent Daily Telegraph letter by E. S. Caldecott. "After all, the parent language here suffered many spellings changes at our own hands during the past three or four centuries," writes Londoner Charles Nock. "We find on going back to Elizabethan times that words like honor, armor, favor, which we now regard as Americanisms, were spelt thus in contemporary documents." In England they now are spelled honour, armour and favour. George W. Hilton, an American teacher, writes that the English couldn't make up their mind about spelling for centuries. "It is said that there were once 80 acceptable spellings of 'scissors.'" ## Winter Is Making Heavy Inroads In Game Birds

HALIFAX (CP)—Starvation caused by freezing snow and heavy ice crusts are taking their toll on game birds in the Maritimes. Fish and game association officials have described conditions as "the worst in years." Faced with the problem of supplying food to thousands of starving game birds, the associations have appealed to farmers and others living in outlying districts to scatter food where the birds may reach it. One of the major problems is the scarcity of grit needed by the birds to aid in digestion of food. Many of the birds have become weakened by lack of food and died, while others have fallen easy prey to predators. The situation has greatly improved in Prince Edward Island after a heavy rain fall over the weekend bared most of the fields. The situation reached a critical stage in January when it was necessary to have planes fly over the flocks dumping a mixture of grain and grit. Officials credit this action with being greatly responsible for easing the situation in the province.

## See Pattern Emerging From Shakeup In Soviet Gov't

(By William L. Ryan, Associated Press News Analyst) A pattern is beginning to emerge from the series of Soviet shakeups. It indicates the Soviet Union hopes for at least four or five more years of grace in which to build its economy. The Communist party has entered into a deal with the forces representing career men of the Soviet Army, and some attention will be paid henceforth to army work on preparations for eventual war. It is good news in this respect: The world may have time to compose its differences, while the internal Soviet structure evolves from a monolithic dictatorship under the Communist party to a sort of hybrid military dictatorship in which conservative army leaders have influence. This seems to follow from the appointment of Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov as defence minister and the spotlighting of other military leaders in the Soviet parliament. The fact that Zhukov has exchanged warm words with President Eisenhower need not presage any softening of Soviet policy toward the United States. But Zhukov is a hard-headed career general likely to think of military consequences ahead of dialectics on the inevitable triumph of world communism. COMPROMISE SEEN There undoubtedly has been a compromise in the Soviet hierarchy. Some of the army leaders' views must be taken into consideration by Nikita S. Khrushchev the leading personality in the Soviet Union today. If Khrushchev has come to terms with the army men, some attention will be paid to the consumer sector of the Soviet economy to quiet the army's fears of a brittle situation which could crack in wartime. Apparently, however, this must be accomplished without sacrifice to the heavy industry sector. The army, if satisfied this can be done, probably will go along with the stepup of Soviet heavy industry which produces armaments. No army is ever interested in weakening a country's armed forces. The Soviet Union, therefore, can be expected to put forward strong talk in the Stalin manner.
