'T'WAS ONLY A JOKE.

Tarte Acknowledges His Failure AND WILL RESIGN HIS SEAT.

OTTAWA, Aug. 10.

In the Tarte-McGreedy enquiry on Saturday, Alderman John Henri explained that his offer to Baskerville to procure the Esquimaux contract for him in consideration of ten thousand dollars was a joke, as he chafed Baskerville every time he met him for his failure to get the contract.

Other witnesses testified, breaking down several of Tarte's charges against Thomas McGreedy, and seriously implicating Tarte himself in charges of conspiracy.

The defence so far have done well, and it is highly probable that they will upset the whole case against Langevin and Thomas McGreedy.

Murphy and Robert McGreedy are very restless. Tarte acknowledges his failure to establish his charges. He puts all the blame on Murphy and Robert McGreedy, who he says misled him. Tarte will resign his seat before prorogation, having promised to do so if he failed to make his case good.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)

HALIFAX, Aug. 10.—Anticosti—Cod and herring reported plentiful at English Bay, but no squid, and there was no fishing of any kind at Fox Bay, owing to strong northwesterly gales.

Quebec—Cod fair at Moirae and Perce, and good at Newport Point. No fishing at Seven Islands or Grand River.

New Brunswick—No inshore fishing this week at Caraquet, and only a few of the bankers have returned. Cod scarce at Point Escuminac, but mackerel fair.

P. E. Island—The mackerel fishing poor at Morningside and Alberton. The weather at the latter place being too blustery for fishing mackerel. Hooking good, and cod fair at Malpeque.

Cape Breton—cod, haddock and mackerel fair at Port Hood; cod good at Chiticamp, but all fisheries dull at other points.

Nova Scotia—Eight to twelve pounds of mackerel taken in traps at Lunenburg to-day; fair takes of cod and herring at Liverpool; herring fishing is good and cod fair; very poor week's fishing last week at Digby, dog-fish having taken full control of the Bay of Fundy; bait, squid, bait, plentiful at Margaree and fair quantity at Port Hood and Cheticamp, and Port Hawkesbury. Vessels can be supplied with bait also at Liverpool.

Y. M. C. A. Meeting.

The meetings of the Maritime Y. M. C. A. Convention at Truro are largely attended, and much interest is manifested.

On Thursday evening the First Presbyterian Church was filled, and the speeches were all first-class.

S. E. Whitson, of Halifax, chairman of the executive committee, read a report upon provincial work in the maritime provinces. His report came under two heads, viz., what has been done for young men? and what should be done for them? Eight new associations had been organized during the past year, and there is a prospect of several more.

Rev. George O. Gates, of St. John, addressed the audience for three-quarters of an hour upon "The Need of Manliness in Christian Life."

Friday morning was devoted to hearing reports from maritime associations by the delegates present and the detailed report of Maritime Secretary Gorton.

Wm. Griffiths addressed the delegates upon the subject of "Christian Beneficence in Y. M. C. A. Work."

The afternoon was spent in reading papers and recommending improvements in the work. The Ladies' Auxiliary tendered a reception to the delegates from 5 to 7.
