## Borden To Take Action Against Dog Owners

BORDEN — The members of the town council decided last night at their regular meeting to take action against dog owners who fail to keep their animals on their own property.

It was reported that several complaints had been received in regard to the dogs running at large. The owners of these dogs will be contacted by the police officer and told to keep their dogs on their own property if this is not done, legal action will be taken.

## Coalition in Laos Expected Today

VIENTIANE (Reuters)—Neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma announced Friday night the three-way coalition government of Laos would be installed today.

The premier designate said rival Laotian factions had reached "agreement on all points" ending a dispute over the wording of the proclamation which threatened to wreck the protracted negotiations for new government which will follow a neutral course.

Souvanna did not say how the quarrel was patched up. Right-wing strongman Gen. Phoumi Nosavan had reverted earlier Friday to his former position that the wording of the proclamation implied the approval of the coalition by the rival-wing national assembly.

## P.E.I. Students Write Exams

Approximately 2,400 grade eight students from P. E. I. schools wrote provincial examinations this week, Malcolm MacKenzie, the deputy minister of education reported yesterday.

Students in grades 10 and 12 begin their examinations on Monday, June 25, and will continue writing throughout the week until Friday, June 29. There are 421 students in grade 12 and 1,132 in grade 10 expected to meet in the 14 centres scattered across the island.

Referring to his department's program of controlling potato disease, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said Thursday that regulations against bringing used potato bags into the province will be strictly enforced.

A presentation on behalf of the congregation of Trinity and Spring Park will be made to Mr. Latimer at the close of the Sunday evening service in Trinity.

## Civil Damages Action Opens In Supreme Court At S'ide

SUMMERSIDE — A civil action case was before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell in Supreme Court yesterday morning at Summerside.

Plaintiff was John Johnston, Central Bellevue, who was a claimant \$2,000 damages. Johnston was represented by George R. McMahon.

Respondent was J. Watson MacNaught, QC, the defendants, Allan Seemle and Willis Mills of Summerside, who were co-claimants \$2,500 for the loss of a motor vehicle and \$400 for the loss of use of the motor vehicle.

The case arose out of an accident near Bellevue, Dec. 20, 1961, about 1 a.m. At the time of the accident, defendant Allan Seemle was driving a 1963 Dodge motor vehicle, owned by Willis Mills. Plaintiff Johnston was driving a 1960 Dodge one-ton truck at the time.

Bruce MacKay, a garage operator in New Anson gave evidence on behalf of the defendant. John Johnston, who also testified.

Cst. A. Burchill and Cst. R. Currie of the Borden detachment, RCMP, the investigating officers gave evidence, as did Charles Dawson, Middleton; Charles Conolly, Summerside.

## New Coroner Is Appointed

SUMMERSIDE — The appointment of Dr. B. B. Gillis as a coroner for Summerside and east Prince area was made Thursday by the provincial government and announced yesterday by the minister of health, Hon. Dr. Hubert McNeill.

Along with coroner Dr. W. E. Callaghan, the newly appointed coroner Dr. Gillis will act in the same area, and the availability of two coroners is expected to result in one being readily available and on call at all times.

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## Commission Ponders Race Track's Penalty

It will likely be sometime next week before the P. E. I. Sports and Race Commission reveals what penalty will be imposed on the Charlottetown Driving Park for holding a harness racing card Thursday night.

The CDP held the card in defiance of a commission warning Thursday that the night had been awarded to the Summerside track, and any race at the Charlottetown track would be illegal.

NO DECISION REACHED

Commission Chairman George Rogers, said yesterday no decision had as yet been reached. Mr. Rogers is due to be out of town for a few days.

At a meeting Thursday, the commission gave the green light to Summerside to hold the card, and warned a severe penalty would be imposed if the CDP did not call off its racing card.

Both tracks had RCMP supervised pari-mutuel betting last night, but the salute test, also under the jurisdiction of the RCMP, was in operation at Charlottetown, only.

## Junior Red Cross Issues Manual

The Canadian Junior Red Cross has recently released a "Teen Home Nursing" Manual designed for both boys and girls.

The manual contains a combination of home nursing, first aid, and baby sitter's course. It was designed to help teenagers prepare themselves for contributions to family and community welfare.

The manual will be used for the first time at the leadership training centre to be held at Montgomery Hall, Charlottetown from July 2 to 13.

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
