NATO council paid more attention to disarmament than at previous session.

The foreign, defence and finance ministers, ending their three-day talks, expressed concern Thursday about the danger of nuclear proliferation and agreed to explore every possible means of obtaining East-West disarmament pacts.

WILL REVIEW PROGRAMS

They also agreed in principle to review their own military planning so as to strengthen NATO's mobile "fire brigade" force. Canada, the United States and Britain believe this force needs more troops, financing and transport. The "fire brigade" unit, which includes one Canadian battalion, is designed to quell small armed clashes before they can turn into a nuclear struggle.

Indians Plan Huge Garden

STONY PLAIN, Alta. (CP)—Enoch Indians at the Stony Plain reserve 10 miles west of Edmonton have organized a huge new vegetable garden, costing them \$110,000.

Began in May, the project has already yielded nearly 700 tons of potatoes, 80 tons of turnips and 15 tons of carrots. Members of the Enoch band do all the work, digging vegetables, packing them, and putting the finishing touches to a warehouse and office building.

"Practically no one was employed" before the project began, says Indian agent Stan Knapp. "The people were wealthy enough to be disorganized."
