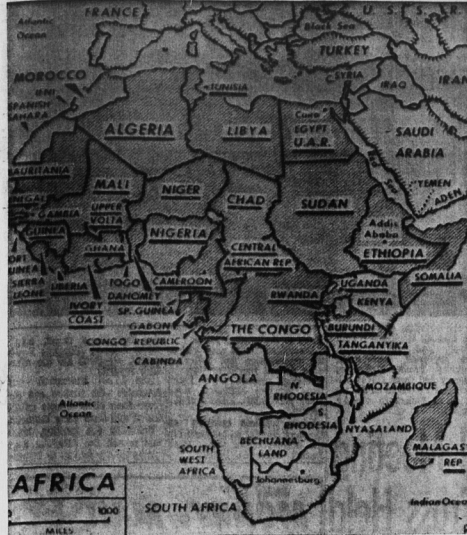

# 31 African Leaders Call For Boycott Of S. Africa

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (Reuters) — African heads of state at the final session of the 31-nation summit conference here Saturday called on all African countries to sever diplomatic and consular relations with white-ruled South Africa and Portugal.

The appeals were made in a resolution on "decolonization" calling for an effective boycott of South Africa and Portuguese foreign trade, including the closing of ports and airports to their ships and aircraft and banning overflights by their planes.

The heads of state also decided to create a volunteer corps in each of their countries to aid "African (Negro) national liberation movements," according to conference sources.

## TO TRAIN NEGROES

The sources said they promised to train Negro nationalists in all sectors, to create special funds to assist them and to facilitate the transit of equipment for them.

The sources said the heads of state also decided to set up a committee to co-ordinate aid from African states to national liberation movements.

A blueprint for a united Africa also was published at the end of the talks.

The "All African charter" agreed on by the heads of state and prime ministers of the independent African states set up an "Organization of African Unity" for the entire continent and for Madagascar and the neighboring islands.

The organization will have the following principal institutions:

1. An assembly of heads of state and government to meet at least once a year.
2. A council of ministers, including the foreign ministers or other designated ministers of member states, meeting at least twice a year.
3. A general secretariat with a secretary-general and one or more assistants.
4. A commission of mediation, conciliation and arbitration to which all disputes between member states would be referred.

ALL PLEDGE PEACE  
All member states will pledge themselves under the charter to settle their differences by peaceful means.

They pledged to create special funds to assist them and to facilitate the transit of equipment for them.

# IOE Has Gift For Memorial

VICTORIA (CP) — The national chapter of Canada, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, will present a gift valued at \$500 for use in construction of the Fathers of Confederation memorial building in Charlottetown.

Mrs. Peter L. Robinson O.D.E., made the announcement after an executive meeting here Saturday following the opening of the IOE annual meeting.

Nature of the gift will be decided after consultation with the architect and building committee of the memorial.

About 400 national and provincial officers in Canada are expected to attend the five-day annual meeting.

VICTORIA (CP) — The Commonwealth has an underlying stability which will prevent its disintegration, members of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire were told Saturday night.

"Britain may have a smaller empire but the Commonwealth is larger and stronger with the years," said national President Mrs. Peter L. Robinson.

Mrs. Robinson was addressing the opening of the annual meeting of the national chapter of Canada, IOE.

She said it is the duty of every member, devoted to civility and service, to convince others of the Commonwealth's desirability.

The president told 400 national and provincial IOE officials attending the annual meeting that the need for leadership "is much greater today than at any other time in the history of the world."

"But it must be leadership with understanding, not leadership with domination and self-aggrandizement," she said.

Mrs. Robinson said the IOE's charter gives vigorous leadership especially in the field of education, one of the IOE's major projects often resulting in government action.

The five-day annual meeting closes today at 11:30 a.m.

Small Girl Finds Cache Of Dynamite  
LAVAL, Que. (CP) — A little girl nicking with her parents Sunday stumbled into a cache of 70 sticks of dynamite and 600 electric detonators near this village.

RCMP said the dynamite probably was left behind by construction workers, though there was no construction site in the immediate area.

Laval is about 15 miles north of Quebec City.

The dynamite was of a different brand than that planted in 19 Quebec City mailboxes last Monday.

Provincial police turned it over to RCMP for storage while an investigation is made. A spokesman said such finds are common and usually can be traced easily to construction work.

ST. JOHNS, Que. (CP) — Thieves made off with a considerable amount of dynamite detonating gear during the weekend from a store quarry in centres 30 miles north of Montreal.

A total of 100 electrical cans, 500 caps, 300 feet of mesh and 90 fuses were stolen from the Lighters Ballroom quarries.

# Yank Tuna Fights With Ecuador

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Tuna fishermen rallied here Saturday when they were 13 miles off the Ecuadorian coast.

The boats are from San Diego, and the fishermen carry hundreds of tons of tuna in their refrigerated holds.

NEW YORK PUBLISHER Dies Of Heart Ailment  
NEW YORK (AP) — Orvil E. Dryfoos, president and publisher of the New York Times, died Saturday following a brief illness. He was 50.

He entered hospital for rest and treatment for heart strain April 15, less than three weeks after the end of the city's three-month newspaper strike.

His health became impaired during a strenuous activity brought on by the labor dispute.

The Times staff dropped to 900 from 3,000 during the strike, and Dryfoos and his advisers mobilized the 900 to keep the daily's Western U.S. and European editions and its newspaper in operation. He also took part in some strike negotiations.

SUCCEEDED SULZBERGER  
Dryfoos became head of The Times in 1962 after his father-in-law, Arthur Hays Sulzberger, stepped down. Four years earlier he had succeeded Sulzberger as president.

Sulzberger had succeeded his father-in-law, the late Adolph S. Ochs.

A sociology major at Dartmouth College, Dryfoos was the son of a wealthy Manhattan hosiery manufacturer. He began his business career as a runner in Wall Street and eventually bought a seat on the New York Stock Exchange.

He joined the newspaper in 1942, six months after his marriage. He worked as a cub reporter, a legman for veteran reporters and as publisher's secretary before being named assistant to Sulzberger in 1943.

Dryfoos was elected vice-president and a board member in 1954 and became more active in the newspaper's business matters.

In 1967, when he was elected president, he became vice-chairman, a new position in the organization. Sulzberger remained as publisher until he retired four years later.

Halifax Angler Drowns In Lake  
HALIFAX (CP) — A 74-year-old fisherman, 46, of Halifax, drowned Saturday in Sheehan Lake, about 16 miles from here. He was fishing from a pier owned by one of his three companions, when the craft overturned. The other two men made a heroic rescue.

# Forest Fires Under Control

HALIFAX (CP) — A Forest fire that threatened several homes in suburban area here was brought under control late Sunday by four fire departments. The burning area was estimated at about one square mile. No valuable timber was lost in the blaze which a spokesman at the Springfield fire department said covered about 400 acres in area. It was one of five blazes in Nova Scotia woodlands reported during the day.

Provincial forestry headquarters at St. John's said four headquarter firefighters were killed and 42 others were injured in the fires. They were believed small. They were near Porters Lake, in Halifax County, near Chester, 45 miles southwest of here and in Cumberland and Yarmouth Counties.
