

Causeway Suggested For Saint John City Outlet

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Consulting engineer D. O. Turnbull said Thursday a half-mile causeway linking this city with outlying Simonds Parish would serve "several purposes," besides disposing of a sewage problem which the municipal council wants corrected immediately.

The causeway, estimated to cost about \$1,400,000, would cross Courtenay Bay and serve as a garbage disposal unit for sewage now pouring into the bay from Marsh Creek.

"The causeway as proposed serves several purposes," the engineer told The Canadian Press. "It eliminates all level crossings in the east end area, shortens the distance between Saint John and East Saint John and gives the city a third exit."

Municipal councillors Wednesday mentioned the causeway as a possible solution to sewage disposal difficulties which one council-

or said threatened to turn a large part of the east end into "a glorified cesspool with no cover on it."

MORE DISCUSSION

The councillors, representing the adjoining cities of Saint John and Lancaster and Simonds Parish, voted to consult with engineers of the federal and provincial governments and the Canadian National Railways on the sewage question. Recommendations will be forwarded to both governments.

Mr. Turnbull said his concept of a gated causeway would prevent a backup of bay water into the creek and a consequent pileup of garbage.

Simonds councillors Fred Cave and John Chard said immediate action was needed to solve the problem caused by 10 Saint John sewers and two from Simonds pouring into the long narrow creek which lies in one area only a few hundred feet from a public housing development.

NEW TRAFFIC OUTLET

A councillor said the area was too swampy for installation of septic tanks. Civil defence officials have long sought a new traffic outlet to supplement two bridges which now provide the city's only exits.

About six feet of water at high tide would cut off the provincial highway leading to Nova Scotia and Quebec if the bridge spanning the Marsh Creek were demolished. Destruction of a span over the reservoir falls would isolate the city to the west.

Expect Princess Margaret Will Visit B.C. In '58

OTTAWA (CP)—Princess Margaret's first official visit to Canada likely will be a trip to British Columbia but not a cross-country tour.

The 26-year-old sister of the Queen has been invited to participate in B.C.'s 1958 centennial and a highly-placed informant says she has indicated informally that she wants to come.

However, the trip is not yet official and no announcement may be made for some time. At the moment the Princess is preparing to tour East Africa starting Sept. 1.

At London, a Buckingham Palace spokesman, asked to comment on the report, said he had no information.

"As far as we know, there are no major entries in Princess Margaret's engagement book for 1958 at the present time," the spokesman said.

REGIONAL TRIP

However, the informant here appeared fairly confident that the Princess will make the trip, providing there are no last-minute hitches.

He indicated the trip would be strictly regional—limited to B.C. Members of the Royal Family, he said, have expressed a wish to visit Canada more frequently but are concerned over the length of time required for a national tour each time a trip is planned.

This "might" Margaret's trip may set a pattern for future royal visits—it might be made to some specific Canadian area only for some specific purpose.

An exception likely will be the prospective visit of Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh to officiate at the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway in 1959.

Her 1959 trip, if it takes place, is almost certain to be a country-wide visit.

Coastal Schooner Lost In Labrador

CARBONAR, Nfld. (CP)—The Earle Freighting Company said Thursday its 200-ton coastal schooner Lilla B. Boutiller ran aground and was wrecked on Pommeau Island in Labrador's Hamilton River.

Capt. Steve Dowden and his crew of seven escaped unhurt to the island and at present are en route to the company's Labrador headquarters at Battle Harbor.

The Lunenburg, N.S., built vessel was under charter to a construction company to run machinery and passengers into Goose Bay farther up the Hamilton River. No passengers were aboard when she grounded.

The motor vessel Short Wave, also owned by Earle's, was in the vicinity and stood by.

The cause was not known. Manseau is 60 miles southwest of Quebec City.

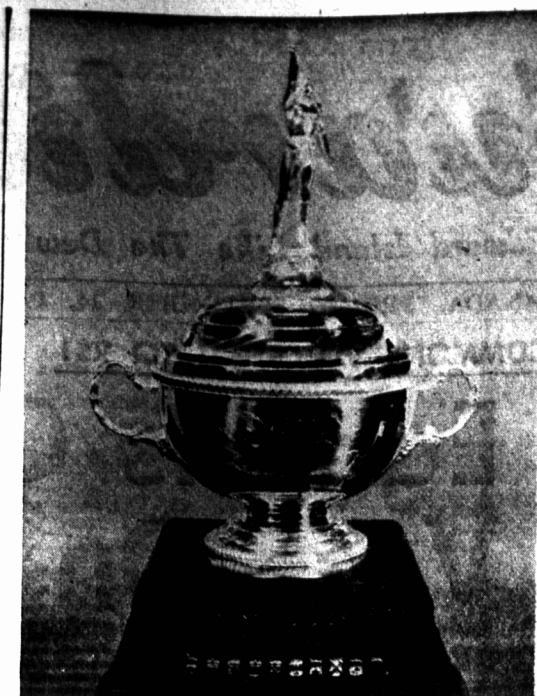

sociation, though he said the United States has no intention of shooting its way through if Egypt blocks the canal.

Dulles took a press conference the U.S. would favor diverting vessels around the Cape of Good Hope under such conditions, regardless of the extra cost involved. Dulles said Washington is ready to consider loans to friendly countries which might be unable to carry such a financial burden.

Warned by Egyptian Ambassador Ahmed Hussein that implementation of the plan for the users' association to hire pilots, fix rates, collect tolls and pay rent to Egypt would "mean war," Dulles appealed to Egypt to reconsider.

CANADIAN OPINION

In Ottawa, Acting Prime Minister Howe said Canada has the Suez crisis under study and has asked Britain for more information on the new proposal.

Howe told reporters that Canada did not have full information on it.

UN APPROACH

In the House of Lords, Earl Attlee, Labor prime minister from 1945 to 1951 demanded immediate reference of the Suez dispute to the United Nations, saying "they work not ideally, but it is all we have got to prevent us from slipping back into a welter of anarchy and war."

In his speech, Lloyd explained the government's reluctance to put the issue before a special assembly of the United Nations by saying it would mean weeks of debate, innumerable amendments asked finally, at the most, a recommendation.

But, recalling that Eden had said it might be necessary to go the security council, he promised that any approach would be "a genuine effort to improve thereby the prospect of a peaceful settlement."

ATTACKS RUSSIA'S VIEW

Lloyd attacked the Russian attitude to the dispute, saying that Soviet Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov had done everything in his power to make it difficult for Egypt to accept the plan for international management of the canal worked out by 18 nations at the recent London Suez conference.

The foreign secretary denied that the British government had in any way sought to influence

As the Semi-annual deduction from teacher's salaries for the super-annuation fund creates financial stress on teachers, be it resolved such deductions be made on a monthly basis.

That the teachers of the Charlottetown Rural assembly in annual convention pledge their support to improve the status of education in the province and to bring to the attention of the proper authorities the inadequacy of the present salary scale for the teachers of the province.

That the Provincial Government be requested to give some special remuneration to teachers holding degrees.

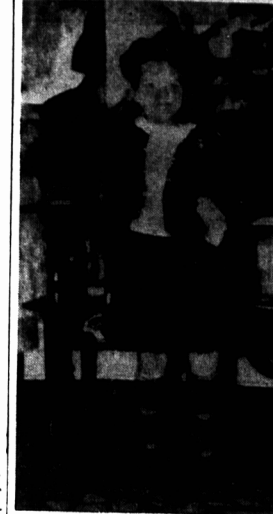
That in the future the Charlottetown Rural convention be held on the last two days of the school week rather than the middle of the week.

Whereas there is a scarcity of qualified teachers and whereas many teachers move from province to province and years of experience are not recognized from one province to another.

Be it resolved that this convention go on record to recommend to Canadian Teacher's Federation that years of service be recognized in all provinces.

Suez Canal pilots to leave their jobs.

Government sources here indicated that reference of the Suez dispute to the security council might be the next step in the crisis if Egypt fails to agree to work with the proposed canal users' association.

The bulk of the Conservative majority in the Commons appeared enthusiastic in support of Eden's handling of the dispute.

One influential Conservative, former attorney-general Sir Lionel Heald, lined up with the Laborites in demanding the government publicly renounce any intention to use force without United Nations sanction.

OTHER DEVELOPMENT

The crisis was pointed up in these other developments:

There was a rush for exit visas among the more than 400 foreign employees of the canal who plan to quit Friday night. They are to be hired by the new Association, perhaps operating from floating bases at sea. Egypt vowed to keep the canal running.

Egypt protested to the United Nations that Britain, France and the old Suez Canal Co., whose canal properties Nasser took over July 26, will be responsible if there is any hitch in traffic because of the foreign experts' walk-out.

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin whose government has backed up Nasser's seizure of the canal, sent personal notes to Prime Minister Eden and French Premier Guy Mollet reported to advise them against the use of force.

India's Prime Minister Nehru, who leads the thinking of neutral Asians, denounced the users' plan.
