**THE ATTORNEY GENERALSHIP.**

The Guardian when apologizing for the Farquharson Government not appointing an Attorney General evidently did not know that the Supreme Court opens at Summerside in a week's time and that it is necessary that the Crown should be represented by an Attorney General. The Crown business of the country must be attended to, and the question is who is to do it? Farquharson cannot reconcile his followers and the result is that he is unable to make an appointment. The Guardian's excuse that the farmers are too busy at their harvest to think of the matter while intended as a joke on Farquharson will not save the frightened Leader. Let the Premier make the appointment, and whether it goes to McKinnon, Peters or Hazard, let him and his government stand or fall by it.

**CLARK WALLACE AND SIR HIBBERT.**

A notable feature of the meeting recently held at Vancouver was the pains taken by Sir Hibbert Tupper and Mr. Clarke Wallace to show that no quarrel now separated them. Mr. Clark Wallace happened to mention Sir Hibbert's name, which was received with loud cheers and some hisses. To silence the latter, Mr. Wallace passionately declared that Sir Hibbert "has held responsible and important positions in the Government and the breath of scandal has never touched him. At one time Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper and I were in the same cabinet. I disagreed with the policy of the Government and I left the Government. Honest men can honestly disagree as to a policy, but I can say this, that in the whole of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper's career there has never been a man who has said he did a dishonest act or could point to a scandal in connection with his administration."

When it came to Sir Hibbert Tupper's turn to speak he returned the compliment. He enthusiastically, as a Vancouverite, welcomed the member for Toronto West to the Pacific coast. "Mr. Wallace," he said, "cannot be considered a stranger in any part of Canada. Canadian as he is, a man so thoroughly connected with all questions that concern you and me, he is not only not a stranger but such a man must be welcome here every time that he comes to Vancouver to every citizen, whether he be Liberal or Tory. Mr. Wallace, of course, has been known to me, for a very long time. He went into Parliament long before I did. He is my senior in that and in many other respects. We sat together since 1882, and, as he states we differed with each other on a question of principle, and on that one question only during that period. It gives me a great deal of pleasure to say that among the many men on both sides of the House who have distinguished themselves there is no man who has taken a stronger position in that House so far as bringing to bear in the discussion of all matters, facts, and knowledge, that will enable a man to take a high position. Mr. Wallace is a very valuable ally and I may say, as a politician, a very dangerous foe."

Stratford Herald: The exploits of the Liberal machine in West Elgin and West Huron were evidently repeated in North Waterloo, the evidence at the latter trial disclosing the same methods and the same style of irregularities. Candid Liberals can no longer take shelter behind the supposition that the corruption was merely local, and sprung from the unwise zeal of home partisans.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

—It is estimated that \$400,000 has been spent by the Ottawa and Toronto Governments in corruption during the by-election.

—The total number of deaths in Boston last year was 10,886, a decrease of 268 from the previous year, and the death rate was the lowest on record in the city.

—Major Weeks, the popular and efficient young commander of the Charlottetown Engineers is the first Canadian officer in Canada to volunteer for services in the Transvaal. Well done!

—The 48th Highlanders, of Toronto, have been invited to attend the Dewey reception at New York and have accepted the invitation. So far as heard this is the only Canadian regiment invited to attend, so it will represent the Canadian militia.

—It is said that immediately upon the arrival of Admiral Dewey he is to be presented with a volume of newspaper clippings relative to his career during the Spanish war, with a handsome table to support the book. If some one were to give General Otis a similar gift wouldn't he be delighted!

—The statement of revenue and expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30 has been prepared, and is as follows:

It will be seen that the increase in revenue is over \$6,500,000, of which nearly \$4,000,000 is in customs receipts, collected under the good old N. P. The debt was increased by \$1,770,000, which about makes up the amount of the surplus. But why should the debt have been increased at all under such conditions?

**RUSSIANS AND ISLANDERS.**

Both Tax Commercial Travellers Seeking Business.

HALIFAX, September 22.—Russia and Prince Edward Island are in the same category as taxing commercial travellers soliciting business. Whether the Russian Czar copied the idea from the Island premier or vice versa, is not stated. At all events a translation of the Russian law, which was passed in 1898, has been received. The law reads in part:

"Such commercial houses only shall have the right to employ commercial travellers in Russia as have paid the tax of the first class, and such manufacturing industries as have paid the taxes of the first three classes. This applies equally to commercial houses and manufacturing industries that have or have not establishments of their own in Russia. The first-class tax for commercial houses is 500 rubles (\$257); those for manufacturing industries are 500, 1,000 and 1,500 rubles (\$257, \$515 and \$772). In addition to this each commercial traveller is required to pay an individual tax of 50 rubles (\$25.75) per annum. Manufacturing industries which have no factories of their own in Russia, but carry on a wholesale trade within the empire through the medium of commercial travellers, are classed with commercial houses. They pay a tax of 500 rubles therefor, instead of those ranging from 500 to 1,500 rubles, provided for manufacturers. The taxes upon manufacturing and trading are assessed according to the official permits granted for the purpose of carrying on either manufacturing industries or trade within the empire. No commercial travellers will be allowed to transact business within the empire as representatives of a commercial house or manufacturing industry until such commercial house or manufacturing industry shall have obtained the prescribed permit."
