The Islanders will be striving for a win tonight to retain their five-point league lead, whereas the Ramblers will be out to strengthen their hold on second place and also climb a little closer to the top.

In their last local appearance, this trio made quite an impression with local fans as they laid out passes with beautiful finesse, skated hard and fast and showed fans one of the nicest goal-scoring plays of the year.

The Islanders are presently in the midst of a two-game scoring slump, having scored only two goals in their last two games. However, when they get back on a fast sheet of home ice tonight, their old form will likely be renewed in their play. The Islanders have had several exciting trips to the land of late and are due for a hard

fight with the Kiley men tonight. For one thing, they have a lead to hold. Another, they have to protect Jim Shirley's league-leading goals-against average and thirdly there are a lot of individual scoring standings to maintain.

Francisco, Los Angeles, Toronto and Minneapolis-St. Paul were discussed. It was learned the league has a 162-game schedule available for 1955.

Marty Marion, new Chicago manager, needed a lefthanded hitting catcher to alternate with Sherm Lollar, his No. 1 man, and Courtney (27-0) fits the bill. Chakales (5-7 with Cleveland and Baltimore) will be used as relief man by Marion, especially in cases where he needs a second pitcher earlier in the game. Brideweser, (26-6) is insurance for Chico Carrasquel in case of injury.

All sorts of deals were in the rumor stage with most of the big league managers in town. St. Louis Cardinals' swap of infielder Solly Hemus to Cincinnati for relief man Frank Smith was stymied by a potential deal between Cincinnati and Brooklyn that would bring second baseman Junior Gilliam to the Redlegs and send outfielder Wally Post and catcher Hobbie Landrith to the Dodgers among others.

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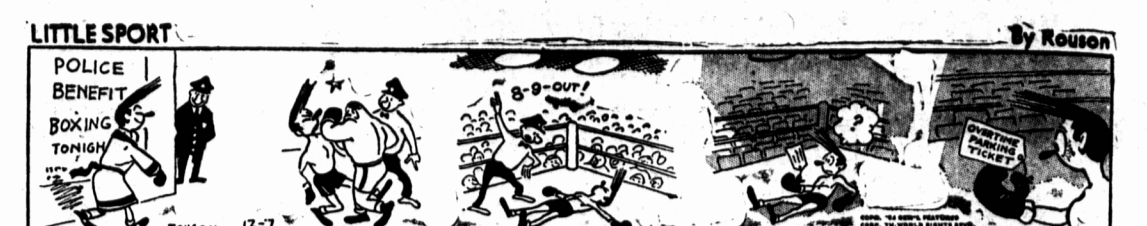

Major Baseball League Attendance Up This Year

NEW YORK (AP)—Major league baseball attendance boomed to 15,335,881 in 1954, an increase of 27 per cent with Milwaukee Braves showing the way to 2,131,356.

Official figures were released Monday by both majors. The National finished with 8,013,517, an eight-percent increase and the American hit 7,322,364, up 14 per cent.

The fine attendance at Baltimore was the big factor in the American. Orioles drew 1,060,910 as compared to the 207,238 who saw them play as St. Louis Browns in 1953.
