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## END OF SESSION AT OTTAWA

### Criticism by Foster and Ferguson.

IMMENSE INCREASE OF EXPENDITURE

A Heavy Addition to the Public Debt.

OTTAWA, June 3.—The third session of the eighth Parliament ended yesterday.

A spirited debate took place in both chambers on the third reading of the Supply Bill.

Foster spoke for over an hour, reviewing the financial career of the Government.

The first part of his speech was a statement of the increases in expenditure, debt, and taxation in two years, and by citations of the resolutions made by Laurier, Mills, and the members of the present Government, before the elections showed that the party in power increased expenditure exactly by the amount they promised to reduce it—10 millions; and that the public debt had increased about twice as fast under this control as during the last four years of Tory rule, when Cartwright pronounced it 'monstrous and dangerous.'

The second part of Mr. Foster's discourse dealt with the reckless and criminal way the Government had broken down the safeguards imposed by the traditions of usage and the constitution against lavish and irresponsible spending of money.

He spoke of the expenditure in excess of the money voted, contracts given out to friends and relatives of Ministers, privately and at private prices, of the great crop of superannuations, of the general increase in ministerial establishment and of general spendthrift methods of the Ministers.

Fielding, in a brief speech, admitted the supply bill to be the largest in the history of Canada.

In the Senate, Ferguson criticized the bill in the light of Mills' own declaration before the elections that a four million reduction could easily be made in current expenses.

### Massacre by the Japanese

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 11.—The feelings of the populace in Formosa have been wrought to the boiling point by indiscriminate and savage butchery of innocent women and children by the Japanese soldiers in the Hozan district. Pirates defeated the soldiers, who were so enraged that when they returned to civilization they attacked the peaceful village of Leonah Tien, set it on fire and murdered the inhabitants.

## FIFTEEN THOUSAND U. S. SOLDIERS

### On the Way to Cuba.

THE STRUGGLE OF THE WAR WILL SOON OCCUR.

A Second Expedition to Start for Porto Rico.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Fifteen thousand American soldiers are now on the high seas to join Sampson's floating army, and the first great struggle between the Spanish and American soldiers is near at hand.

With this expedition under way, the military authorities are turning their attention to the capture of Porto Rico, and a second expedition is likely soon to start.

The entire expedition to Santiago numbers 15,340 men, of whom 752 are officers and 14,451 privates.

There are 18 regiments of regulars.

According to the present status, the fleet will not arrive off Santiago before Thursday. There are 32 transports and 16 war vessels in the fleet.

### Schley's Tribute to Hobson.

Commodore Schley has paid a beautiful tribute to Hobson and his men in the following words:

"History does not record an act of finer heroism than that of those gallant men. I watched the Merrimac as she made her way to the entrance of the harbor, and my heart sank as I saw the perfect bell of fire that fell upon those devoted men.

"I did not think it possible one of them could have gone through it alive. They went into the jaws of death. It was a Balclava over again without the means of defence which the Light Brigade had.

"Hobson led a forlorn hope without the power to cut his way out. But fortune once more favored the brave, and I hope he will have the recognition and promotion he deserves. His name will live as long as the heroes of the world are remembered."

### A Russian Prince's Misfortune.

NEW YORK, June 11.—Prince Alexandrovitch Galitzin, descended from royal ancestry, was taken from Bellevue hospital yesterday and lodged in a padded cell at Bloomingdale asylum. After running the entire social gamut, from the most exclusive houses to the coteries of Bohemia, he passed into the land of lost minds. He went broke several years ago. Now he has gone mad and is suffering from acute mania. The cause is poverty and want.

### Lances in Their Tongues.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 10.—Sir Chas. Mitchell, Governor of the Straits Settlement who has arrived here tells of the torturing of Kling women for religious purposes in the streets of Singapore. A number of Kling women marched from the temple in Serangoon road to the temple in Tank road with lances thrust through their tongues, lips and cheeks, the tongues being thrust out. men who accompanied them threw water in their faces.
