Canadian Troops Will Live In Korean Schools; Housing Big Problem

OTTAWA, Nov. 21—(CP)—Regardless of what they thought of schools at home, Canadian troops are going to like them in Korea, Brig. Frank Fleury has stated. The reason, reporters were told by the head of Canada's military mission in Tokyo, is that Korea is such a "grim, poverty stricken" land the schools are among the few places where Western troops can be sheltered.

The advance party of 345 Canadians, for instance, now is living in two schools on an island in Pusan harbor. "We couldn't take over the homes of the peasants," he said. "The troops couldn't stand them."

The schools were used after being thoroughly cleaned and de-loused—twice. Korean was reminiscent of Italy in its peninsula formation its stanches, its mountains and its threat of disease. But its mountains were probably even more rugged and the weather, in the north, could hit 30 below zero.

It was reminiscent of Italy, too in the gathering conglomeration of American, British, Australian, Thai, Turkish, Philippines and Canadian troops.

The Canadians would find two basic types of currency, military payment certificates and local—Japanese or Korean—currency. The former were good wherever there was an American establishment such as a hotel or post exchange. Local currency could be bought but, to stop black-marketing, couldn't be converted back into military certificates.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 22—(AP)—Horse trainer John S. Latimer drew a one-year suspension from the Maryland Racing Commission today after a hearing on charges that one of his thoroughbreds was doped Nov. 13 at Pimlico.

The horse, Bob's Birthday, won a race by six lengths that day and paid \$18.20 for \$2.

Racing steward Joseph Flanagan testified that tests later showed the horse had been stimulated with a drug.

Latimer told the commission he knew nothing about the stimulation but admitted he had bet \$100 on Bob's Birthday to win.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 22—(AP)—John Grosch, Orleans parish (county) criminal sheriff, denied in a sworn statement today that he ever had knowledge of—or bet on—"fixed races" at the fair grounds here.

The New Orleans Item quoted Grosch in a published interview last week as saying: "I made about \$50,000 on boat (fixed) races when I was chief of detectives for the city of New Orleans."

Grosch with his lawyer, Richard Dowling, appeared before a meeting of the Louisiana Racing Commission today.

The commission said in calling the meeting it wished to learn of any fixing of races so that it could bar offenders from the track for life.

After the meeting, A. S. Drew, Minden, La., chairman of the com-

mission, said Grosch's statement "was a satisfactory explanation."

Grosch said in his five-page statement that some 20 years ago—the racing commission was organized in 1940—he did place bets on the basis of "hot tips."
