PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.—The House met about four o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Isaac Oxenbun was appointed official reporter, and the journal of Elizabeth & Moore for printing the debates was accepted, it being the lowest. Mr. H. C. McDonald submitted the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, which was ordered to be read a second time this afternoon. In reply to a question by the Leader of the Opposition, Mr. Pevers said that the Public Accounts would be laid before the House as soon as the Governor-in-Council passed the necessary minute. MILITIA.—According to the last Militia General Orders, No. 3 Company, 82nd Battalion, commanded by Captain D. Stewart, stands highest in the returns showing the general efficiency of the different battalions of Infantry throughout the Dominion. The number of marks made by the Company is 124—the possible being made in four out of the eight tests, and in three of the remaining tests the result being only two less than the possible. A Clever Islander Abroad.

THE Boston correspondent of the San Francisco Chronicle furnishes that paper with an interesting illustrated article dealing with some of the literary lights in the "hub of the universe." Oliver Wendell Holmes, James Jeffrey Roche, Mr. Margaret Doland, Minnie Gilmore and Louise Imogen Guiney are among those mentioned. We extract the reference to Mr. Roche, which reads as follows:—

"James Jeffrey Roche is one of the brightest of Boston's younger generation of poets. His historical ballads dealing with the victories of American men of war on the high seas have won him considerable appreciation at the hands of all true and patriotic Americans. Several of his dashing lyrics have recently appeared in the pages of the Century and other first-class periodicals. Mr. Roche's literary talents are of a very high order. He is the chosen poet of all important events or occasions in Boston and is personally very popular with all classes of the community. He edits the Pilot, a weekly newspaper, which is one of the brainiest sheets in New England, and is, moreover, a valued contributor to the pages of New York Life, Mr. Roche is, socially, the soul of geniality. He has a magnetism which draws friends in hosts around him. In address he is very lively, and resembles the modern Parisian in his grace of manner and gesticulation. I should say that Mr. Roche is, on the whole, the best-liked literary man within the precincts of the 'Hub.'"
