A deficit of \$2,904.00 was forecast for the year 1950 at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening. Councillor J. L. Gorrill, chairman of the finance committee presented the estimates and announced that there would be no change in the tax rate this year. Estimated revenue for the year is \$198,406.00 and estimated expenditures are \$199,400.00. Councillor Gorrill said that an increase in expenditures over the previous year was estimated at \$297.92 and that it was estimated that revenue will decrease by \$5,403.00. This decrease is anticipated even though the assessed real estate value has increased by \$109,521.00 and personal property has also increased in value.
