Tomato Milk 1-4 cup tomato juice 1-4 cup milk

Jellied Tomato Consomme 2 cups tomato juice 1-4 cup water

Heat tomato juice, consomme and water to boiling point. Dissolve gelatine soaked in the cold water in hot liquid.

Jellied Tomato Cheese Salad 1-4 cup tomato juice 1-4 cup milk

Tomato Tea Biscuits 2 cups flour 1-2 cups baking powder

Soak gelatine in cold water. Dissolve over hot water. Mix together all ingredients. Stir in dissolved gelatine. Pour into moulds rinsed with cold water.
