Slashing Speech by Kenny

KIRK'S NEW PLANK

Grit Boodle and Rum in Nova Scotia.

CAPE BRETON RAILWAY.

Macmaster to the Front.

HALIFAX, Feb. 11. Mr. Kenny, whom every Irishman in the Maritime Provinces will be pleased to have for a representative, delivered a rattling speech in this city last night, pointing out that the Grits returned to power in 1874 with one hundred of a majority, and might have held power for twenty years. But they had no policy except establishing soup kitchens, and were ignominiously defeated in 1878. In 1882 they had no policy—and they have none now. They cannot succeed, because Canada is too intelligent to again entrust the Government to a party without a policy.

Mr. Kirk, the Grit candidate here, has introduced a new plank into the Grit platform. Such questions as "The Fisheries," "Reciprocity," and "Canadian Pacific Railway" he does not condescend to notice. But he pledges himself to attack Lord Lansdowne's pianoforte, and to reduce the number of Parliamentary pages!

SYDNEY, C. B., Feb. 11. Fifteen hundred men are already employed in the construction of the Cape Breton Railway. DIEBY, Feb. 11. Mr. Vail, the opposition candidate, is flooding this County with bad rum, in barrels marked "Vinegar," in order to debauch the electorate and help forward the cause of Reform.

PUQUASH, Feb. 11. The Grits of this County have received a supply of Ontario boodle, which, with the assistance of bad whiskey, they are using in a vain hope to keep Sir Charles Tupper's majority below 1000.

MONTEAL, Feb. 11. Mr. McMaster is daily growing in favor in Glengarry. He is receiving much unexpected aid from prominent Liberals, who are disgusted with his opponent, Purcell, whose only qualification is his boodle.

At a monster meeting at Greenfield, George McGillivray and Col. B. McLennan, two leading Grits, made stirring speeches in support of Mr. McMaster, whose election is certain.

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THE WAR CLOUD.

ANXIOUS FOR REVENGE.

A CONFLICT INEVITABLE.

PRSTH, Feb. 11. The Buda Pesth, Journal urges Austria to attack Russia before the latter has completed her preparations on the Lower Danube. It says: "War is inevitable, and it is better to begin fighting before the Balkan States have been Russified. Austria would, by so doing, secure an alliance with Serbia and Bulgaria giving her 100,000 additional troops."

The Berlin Post's Paris correspondent writes: "A deceptive calm followed your recent article referring to General Boulanger, but he is now more powerful than ever, even his former opponents are turning toward him as to the rising sun, finding it impossible to struggle against the growing popularity of a man who is regarded by the masses as the long expected liberator. The whole country is anxious for revenge, and is arming silently, but with the evident belief that the hour is coming."

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THE principal feature of the carnival yesterday was the sleigh drive, which included private vehicles, trades cars and winter embellished cars. Over 5,000 took part in it; and it was witnessed by thousands more, the streets all along the three mile route being crowded with spectators. A significant incident was sleighs bearing such notices as "REMEMBER 1878," "PROTECTION FOR HOME INDUSTRIES," "N. P. WORKINGMEN LOOK OUT FOR YOUR INTERESTS." They were greeted with hearty cheers all along the line.

THE Irish Problem. LONDON, Feb. 11. Lord Hartington's latest speech revealed the fact that he is wavering on the Irish question. The question, he said, was "What are we waiting for?" Ireland was now admittedly orderly in many parts and surely the time was opportune to satisfy her wants, even if Parliament adopted the Canadian Scheme for Ireland.

The Coal Strikers.

LONDON, Feb. 11. The London English labor unions are being appealed to contribute \$40,000 a week for the support of the striking coal miners. NEW YORK, Feb. 11. A general desire is manifested among the coal handlers to return to work.

The Home Rule Tide.

LONDON, Feb. 11. John Morely in a recent speech at Newcastle, said that the Conservative Liberal-Union coalition was crumbling away and that the Home Rule tide was flowing slowly but steadily.
