LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

What has it Done?
SIR,—Your correspondent "Citizen," in
Tuesday's issue asks the question "What
has the Scott Act Done," and proceeds to
answer it in his own way, a way which at
the risk of being very polite, I must dis-
tate as not only unfair, but dishonest
and stupid. He says:—"It has actually
reduced the bulk of crime, brought up
year by year, in the police court, to
half the former proportions. I have com-
pared the result of three years under each
system, and here give the result. Take
the returns of our Police Court from 77
to 79, inclusive. In these years there
were up for trial for drunkenness: 1877,
729; 1878, 370; 1879, 235—1334. Sent up
to Supreme Court: 1877, 18; 1878, 10;
1879, 8—total, 36. In the years 1881, 1882,
1883 there were up for same offences:
1881 (drunk), 193; 1882, 218; 1883, 250—
Total, 661. Sent to Supreme Court: 1881,
2; 1882, 3; 1883, 13—Total, 18."
Why does not "Citizen" take the three
whole years immediately preceding the
year in which the Scott Act came into
operation? Why does he go back to 1877?
Why does he omit 1880 altogether from his
statistics? Because to fairly state it, would
instead of 1,334 give him a total of 863.
The Act came into force the 2nd August,
1881, and if "Citizen" wished to state the
case fairly, he would take the two whole
years immediately preceding 1881,
when licenses were granted, and
compare with 1882 and 1883, the only two
whole years of the operation of the Act,
and he would have under the License sys-
tem in 1879, arrests for drunkenness, 235,
and in 1880, for the same cause, 258; while
under the Scott Act for 1882-83 he would
have 218 and 250 respectively.
But what has "Citizen" to say about
the great reformation that was going for-
ward before this worse than useless Act
was brought in to work all kinds of evil?
What about the temperance movement so
vigorously taken hold of by His Lordship
the Bishop of Charlottetown, and in which
he was later on so ably assisted by Rev.
G. W. Hodgson, and by the Rev. Fathers
McGillivray and Gillis. To what does
"Citizen" attribute the facts, as shown by
his own figures, taken "from the returns
of our Police Court from '77 to '79 inclu-
sive"—the facts that in these years the
arrests for drunkenness were 729 for 1877,
for 1878 they were 370, and for 1879 they
were 235, or less than in 1883, when the
"Act" had been in operation nearly two
and a half years. Surely none of these
things can be credited to the miserable
abortion known as the Canada Temperance
Act.

Messrs. Prowse & Son's New
Starch Factory.
The new starch factory built at Murray
Harbor this summer for Messrs. Prowse
& Sons, is now completed and in opera-
tion. It is a thoroughly equipped factory
having all the latest improvements. One
most noteworthy improvement, and de-
serving special mention, is the double-
washer, which gives the potatoes an extra
cleaning, and thereby produces a more
superior quality of starch than by the
single washer.
The size of the building is as follows:—
The potato house, 30 x 35 feet, the tank
house and workroom, 65 x 55 feet, and the
dry house, 90 x 37 feet, all connected,
forming an L. Attached to the end of the
dry house is a storeroom for storing the
starch when manufactured, and in bags ready
for market. The factory reflects credit on
the energetic contractors, Messrs. McKin-
non & McLean, of Charlottetown. Though
detained by a very late spring in the com-
mencement, they have pushed their work
through with remarkable vigor. The most
of the machinery is their own make, and
all of the very best. The mill has a
capacity of grinding over 2,000 bushels of
potatoes per day, and thus affords when
operated an unfailing home market for all
the surplus potatoes of that section of the
country. The site also is worthy of men-
tion, being built on the old mill site of
John Cowan, Esq., is very central, less than
a mile from shipping, and is quite con-
venient for all parties concerned.
This new branch of business will very
much tend to increase the already exten-
sive business of the enterprising owners.
Besides running a large general retail
business, they have in connection a lobster
factory and fishery, operated every season,
on Indian Island, about two miles from
their store. They also own half in-
terest in the large lobster factory at
Guernsey C. v. s., running under
the style of Prowse, & LeLacheur
Bros. The employment which their large
business gives must be of great benefit to
the people of that place.
In their new venture we wish them the
success which they deserve, and have no
doubt it will prove a general benefit to the
farming population.

In consequence of the clamour of the

Lakeville Notes.

The fishing season is now about wound
up. Mackerel fishing, by hook and line,
has been a complete failure, but lobsters
have been very plentiful, and those engaged
in that business were very successful.
Duck shooting is all the rage now, and
the young sports of the place have secured
quite a booty. Mr. Charles Rose shot the
greatest number thus far—being thirty-
eight—and among other game he secured a
curious bird, not heretofore known in this
place—somehow resembling a robin in his
plumage—somehow resembling a crow in his
size, and of enormous size, and the covering
more resembling hair than feathers. Mr. Rose
intends raising the bird among his other
domestic fowls.
Mr. Philips and his son George, while
gathering sea manure about 11 o'clock on
the night of the 3rd, were very much
startled by an unusual commotion in the
water close at hand. The night being
dark, they could not at first discern the
cause. At length they discovered what
appeared to be a huge serpent writhing and
twisting in the water, and at times furiously
lashing the sea with its tail, and its
eyes shining as if on fire. Both men were
so terrified that they rode home and gave
the alarm, when a number of persons
armed with forks, etc., were soon on the
spot, but in the meantime the monster had
decamped, leaving Mr. Philips and those
who accompanied him, to gather their kelp
unmolested.
Our enterprising friend, Mr. T. Rose, has
his shop neatly fitted up for the purpose
of accommodating travellers. In addi-
tion to his refreshment saloon, he has also
a cabinet room, where he manufactures
pictures and motto frames, desks, repairing
clocks, and doing various kinds of handi-
work.
While Mr. D. McInnis and his little boy
were out fishing eels, on the 5th, the canoe
took a lurch, throwing both into the water.
Mr. McInnis easily found his way to the
shore, but the boy was almost drowned
before assistance reached him.

skate of uncommon size.

store in course of construction at the North
