Would Like U.S. Division In War Games Next Year

CAMP GAGETOWN, N.B. (CP) Many officers here would like to see an American infantry division imported next summer to do mock battle with the 1st Canadian Infantry Division.

Their main argument for such a move is that the present system of exercising the division here is unrealistic. One battalion of 1,000 men represents the enemy force and is pitted against six infantry battalions and artillery and tank regiments of the 1st Division.

To simulate equal numbers, the enemy battalion is supposed to represent a complete division. Thus the platoon which actually carried out a paratroop Monday was supposed to represent a parachute battalion and the 1st Division had to deal with it accordingly.

Officers say it is hard for 1st Division soldiers to imagine one tank as six or to picture a 10-man section as a 150-man infantry company.

WORTH COST

They contend it would therefore be worth the cost to bring in an American division from New England for the fourth divisional exercise next summer. Not only would the exercise be made completely realistic, but it would enable the Canadian and U.S. armies to pick up tips on each other's tactics and weapons.

Some soldiers feel it might be better merely to split the division in two for the exercise. But senior officers say this would defeat the whole purpose of operating the di-

Court Cases At Geo'town

Stipendiary magistrate's court was held at Georgetown yesterday afternoon, July 31st, with Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet presiding.

Three residents of Souris were each sentenced to three months in jail after each had pleaded guilty to charges of assault causing bodily harm. The charges followed an assault by the three individuals on a member of the Souris detachment of the R.C.M.P. A further charge of causing a disturbance by swearing and using obscene language against one of the parties convicted on the assault charge, resulted in a plea of guilty and a fine of \$20, or thirty days in default. Another party to the above mentioned assault charge cases, was charged with failing to stop at the scene of an accident and was fined \$50.00 or sixty days in default. All three parties were represented by Lester O'Donnell of Charlottetown.

Two residents of Montague were each fined \$20, for being intoxicated in a public place.

A resident of Murray River was sentenced to 14 days in jail on a charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated.

Ian M. MacLeod, Crown prosecutor, represented the Crown in all cases.

Forecast Traffic Deaths At 50

OTTAWA (CP)—A traffic death toll of 50 during the coming civic holiday weekend in Canada was forecast Wednesday night by the Canadian Highway Safety Conference. The conference anticipated at least half would be in Ontario.

The conference noted that Aug. 5 is not a national holiday and there is no way of knowing how many Canadian communities will proclaim the civic holiday. But its estimates of 50 deaths was forecast on the basis of past accident experience combined with current traffic trends.

It believed half the fatalities would be in Ontario because there will be more Ontario communities proclaiming the civic holiday than in other provinces. On the average Ontario, with the greatest vehicle registrations of any province, is responsible for 35 per cent of Canada's highway deaths.

NEW YORK (AP)—It costs the city of New York about \$40,000,000 annually to provide food and shelter for 10,000 families on relief rolls because of alcoholic fathers. The welfare department estimated New York has 300,000 alcoholics.
