THE PREMIER.—The steamer Premier arrived from Halifax yesterday afternoon with a general cargo and Mrs Luddington, Sisters St. Mary, St. Catherine, St. Antonio, St. Richard and St. Hew as passengers. She sailed at ten o'clock last night on return via Summerside, with a general cargo and 1023 cases lobsters shipped by James E. Grant, of this city.

TO TAKE THE POTATO BUG.—A friend called at this office yesterday with a needed information with that scourge of the farmer—the potato bug. He said the best mode he had as yet seen for taking the bug was with an ordinary tin pan and a piece of wood or a shingle. By holding the pan closely under the plant and giving a sharp blow with the stick on the opposite side almost every bug will be thrown into the pan. This is much better than picking them off one by one.

GOLD.—Another rich stroke was made at the Annsand gold mine at Montague on Friday last, the gross proceeds from which will not up between \$1,000 and \$2,000. One piece of quartz, about the size of a sugar bowl, contained in all probably five hundred dollars worth of the metal. The plates will be cleared up to-day and it is also expected that a nugget will be unearthed to-day or to-morrow as the nugget earth is now being encountered.—Halifax Mail.

NOTHING is changed in the position of the Province of Quebec Lottery by the action of the Senate, which suppressed the amendment adopted by the House of Commons relating to the lotteries. In other words the law remains as in the past.

The Province of Quebec Lottery will consequently continue to operate as before in virtue of the rights it holds from the local legislature. Furthermore the federal law concerning the lotteries will not come into force before July 1st, 1893.—Quebec Mercury, July 12th, 1892.

I. O. F. NOTES.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge meets at Portland, Oregon, on Monday, 19th September ensuing. No doubt the present Deputy Grand Sire, Dr. Cl. T. Campbell, of London, Ont., will be elected Grand Sire, which will be the first time in the history of the order that the distinction will be given a Canadian. Hon. John W. Stoughton, of Rochester, N. Y., is mentioned as the coming Deputy Grand Sire. John T. Stewart, Esq., Mayor of East Portland (formerly of Cardigan, P. E. I.) is chairman of the accommodation committee. The grand body will be welcomed by the Governor of the state and civic officials of Portland. Questions of vital importance to the order all over the world will be brought up for discussion. The Maritime Provinces will send three representatives. It is probable that the session for 1893 will be held at Chicago, Ill.

HALIFAX NEWS.

Royal Engineers to be Sent to St. John's.

HALIFAX, July 21. A cable despatch was received from London yesterday by the military authorities here, ordering a company of royal engineers to be sent to St. John's, Newfoundland. They will blow down all dangerous walls and raze parts of buildings.

Ministerial Visit—Fatal Accidents.

MONTREAL, July 21. Hon. Messrs. Chapleau and Oumit will visit the Maritime Provinces in the near future. There were two more fatal accidents yesterday. Dr. Dufour fell off a wharf at Hochelaga and was drowned, and a painter named Lafortune fell from a scaffold and was killed.

Talk of the Politicians.

TORONTO, July 21. The election of Mr. Boyd, the Government candidate in Marquette, by acclamation is the talk of the politicians. The only Grit member from the western provinces was from there, and when he resigned the grits boasted that they would hold the seat.

A Household Tragedy.

MONTREAL, July 21. Mrs. Geo. Grant, an insane woman, has been sent to the asylum after stabbing her husband within an inch of his life, and choking two of her children until they were unconscious.

Another Labor Difficulty.

NEW YORK, July 21. Eight thousand workmen are idle as a result of the strike of union house smiths.

General Telegraphic News.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—The house to-day adopted an amendment to the Sundry Civil Appropriation bill, making it unlawful for an officer of the Government authorized to make contracts, or any officer of the district of Columbia to contract with any person, firm or corporation which employs Pinkerton detectives, or other association men, as armed guards. No employees of such agencies are to be employed in any government service or by an officer of the district of Columbia.

ROME, July 19.—The province of Ravenna, in northern Italy, was swept by a terrific cyclone to-day. An enormous amount of property was destroyed, and it is believed many lives were lost. The village of Polezzoli, seven miles south of the town of Ravenna, containing nearly 4,000 inhabitants was almost completely wiped out of existence. Many villages were buried in the ruins of their homes.

PASTH, July 19.—One hundred and eighty reapers, men and women, employed in Bebar, Hungary, struck to-day for an increase in wages. When their demands were refused they seized a wagon loaded with corn. Their employer summoned the gen d'armes, and the strikers threatened to burn the farmer's house and lay waste his fields if he did not comply with the demand. They also threatened the gen d'armes if the latter interfered. The inspector commanding the gen d'armes ordered the men to fire on the rioters and they fired forty-two rounds. Twelve men and women were killed and many wounded before the mob were driven from the place.

The Canadian Fisheries.

HALIFAX, July 21. P. E. Island—Cod, hake and mackerel continue at Geo'town. Bait and ice—Herring bait at Arichat and a few squid at St. Anns and Ingonish. Ice procurable at Arichat, C. B.
