OTTAWA (CP) — The Navy's Arctic patrol ship Labrador leaves Halifax early next month for her third annual voyage into northern waters, carrying scientists and scientific gear to pierce the icy mysteries of the region. The navy said Friday night 10 civilian scientists will be aboard this year when she sails July 3. Some will engage in extra soundings and charting along the shores of Fox Basin south of Baffin Island. Others will study ice degradation in the area and circulation of waters in the basin, perhaps remaining on ice floes for days at a time.
