

A Singular Case.

A WOMAN WHO HAS NOT WALKED FOR TEN YEARS RUNS AWAY.

Mrs. George Chenell, of Le Clarie, who has been an invalid for years and bed-ridden all the time, disappeared from her home on Saturday about midnight. She left a note to her husband stating what she proposed to do and making certain bequests. The strangest part of the whole affair is that Mrs. Chenell has not walked a step for the past ten years. As soon as her departure was discovered, active and thorough search began, and by noon Sunday the excitement ran very high. Many thought she had drowned herself in the river, and its bottom, for a long distance, was dragged with grappling hooks. Some hinted at foul play, and the husband, all this time frantic with grief, was by force prevented from destroying himself. The search still continued, and every nook and corner of the town and adjacent woods was visited by anxious and excited crowds, to discover the whereabouts of the unfortunate woman. About 4 p. m., she was found in the back part of Mrs. Carleton's lot, about a quarter of a mile from home, lying down secreted as well as could be by the tall weeds and bushes. Here she must have remained 15 or 16 hours, with only a bed-quilt as a covering and protection from the winter's blast. She was minus one slipper, and otherwise very thinly clad, but was living and partly conscious, and at last accounts was doing well.

Terrible Kerosene Accident.

A fatal catastrophe occurred on Thursday, six miles from Danville, Vt., in Pittsford county. Mrs. May, an aged widow lady, living with her two daughters, one being Miss Kate May, a beautiful young lady, eighteen years of age, and the other Mrs. Herndon, a married lady, was placing a kerosene lamp on the mantel, about eight o'clock last evening, when it was overturned and an explosion followed. Mrs. May was enveloped in the flames in a moment. Mrs. Herndon and Miss Kate May ran to their mother's assistance, when the clothing of both took fire. The three ladies rushed into the yard. Mrs. May and Miss Kate continued to run round in a circle screaming and praying loudly for help until they fell dead in their tracks, completely suffocated and most frightfully burned. Mrs. Herndon had the presence of mind to fall down and roll over continually, by which means the flames which enveloped her were finally subdued, but she was terribly burned and became unconscious. The bright glare of the flames attracted a neighbor, who arrived upon the spot as soon as possible, but only in time to find Mrs. May and Miss Kate two burning corpses, and Mrs. Herndon lying on the ground unconscious. Mrs. Herndon, though still alive, is in a very precarious condition, and but little hope of her recovery is entertained.
