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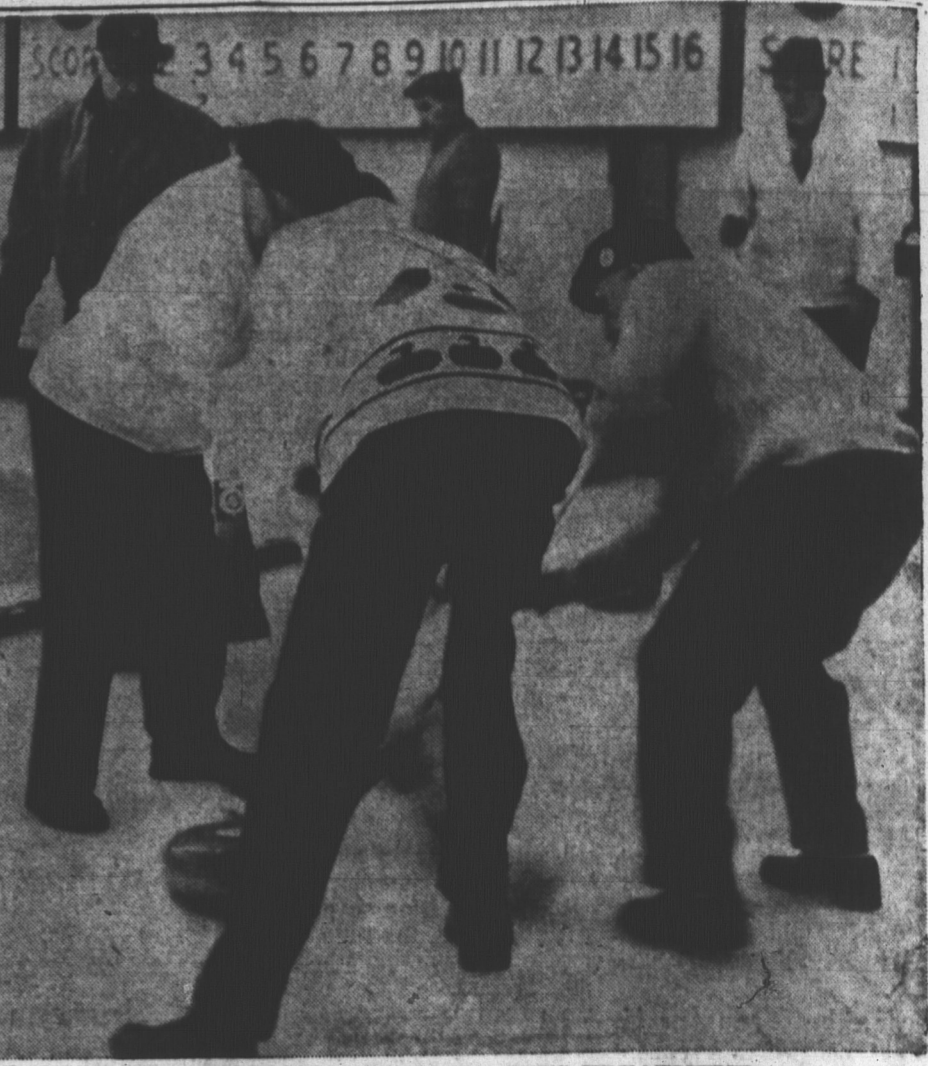
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FRED MACMILLAN ROCK GETS TREATMENT

Boston Bops Black Hawks; Pit Martin Tallies Four

BOSTON (AP) - Centre Pit Martin fired four goals Thursday night to lead Boston Bruins to a 5-3 National Hockey League victory over Chicago Black Hawks.

It was the fourth victory in a row for Bruins and second in a row for Boston over the Black Hawks.

Martin's four goals equalled the team scoring record set by Woody Dumart against the Black Hawks March 4, 1951.

Martin's first goal, his eighth of the season, came at 4:03 of the first period on an assist from Johnny Bucyk. He scored again at 15:17 of the period, and his third came at 18:02 of the second period. His fourth goal came at 2:02 of the finale, again on an assist from Bucyk.

Chicago's scoring star, Bobby Hull, generally handicapped by Boston's Eddie Westfall, broke loose only once to score his 40th goal of the season in the second period.

HAS MORE TO PLAY Chicago has 26 more games to play in the 70-game schedule. Fighting broke out during the first period. Boston's Teddy

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
