CANADIAN NOTES.

Another Bombshell Among the Rielites—Heavy Fires.

MONTREAL, Dec. 20. Another bombshell has been thrown in the ranks of the "National Party," as the Rielites are called, by the resignation of W. J. Watts, member for Drummond and Arthabaska in the local house, because Watts is not in sympathy with the views of a majority of his constituents on the Riel question.

Mr. Watts who is known as very clever lawyer, was a member of the Codification Committee of the Quebec legislature. A fire in McDougall, Logie & Co's. oil warehouse yesterday morning, caused a loss of \$100,000 on stock and \$40,000 on buildings, covered by insurance. The warehouses adjoining suffered about \$10,000. Loss also covered by insurance.

Another Gladstonian Manifesto.

LONDON, Dec. 19. The following despatch from Gladstone was received by the Cable News Company:

"HAWARDEN, Dec. 19. "If I should at any time have any plan or intention to announce on the question of Irish government, it will be done publicly and on my own responsibility, not by anonymous and irresponsible declarations. My political friends are assured that I remember my obligations to them, and they may safely understand I am bound to none of the ideas respecting Home Rule for Ireland recently announced in my name. After saying this much, I hold myself excused from replying to any further enquiries, rumors or allegations regarding the Irish question. (Signed) "WM. E. GLADSTONE."

Ontario Legislature—Smallpox in Toronto—Personal.

TORONTO, Dec. 20. It is officially announced that the Ontario Legislature will be called together for business on January 28th.

At the express request of Bishop Cleary, of Kingston, Rev. Father McWilliams will immediately institute a criminal libel against Luxton, of the Free Press, Winnipeg, in order to clear his reputation as a priest of the Church.

Smallpox is evidently spreading here, another patient, William Beard, teamster, having been removed to the Smallpox Hospital, yesterday.

Important Conviction.

DUBLIN, Dec. 19. The second trial of Wm. Sheehan, for the murder of the Mosher (sister and brother), near Castletown, County Cork, in 1877, resulted in the conviction of the prisoner, who was sentenced to be hanged on the 20th of January.

The Floods.

WILKESBARRIE, Pa., Dec. 19. Men were busily engaged in the attempt to rescue the imprisoned miners at Nanticoke. The officials state that there are 22 men in the mine. There is little ground for hope that they will be rescued alive.

Destructive Typhoon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19. Advice from Yokohama and Hong Kong to-day, state that a typhoon swept over the Philippine Islands Nov. 7th, destroying over 4,400 buildings, 18 lives were lost, and 500 head of cattle perished.

Still a Mystery.

BUCTOCHE, Dec. 19. The disappearance of Nenas Perry from Anthony White's place, on the 28th of November last, is still involved in mystery, and an unusual interest is felt in the matter.

THE COAL TRADE.—North Sydney Herald: The coal trade in this harbor has been very dull this fall, and the out-put will be much smaller than last year. At the old Sydney mines particularly there has been a great falling off in the out-put, which up to the end of last month only 99,000 tons, compared with 114,000 tons last year. The falling off is mainly owing to the small-pox scare, which drove shipping to other ports. Never was shipping so scarce in this harbor and Sydney as during the months of October and November. Even the western shore trade, which formerly came to this port, did not put in an appearance this fall.

ANNAPOLIS, N. S., claims to have shipped 7,000 barrels apples this season, to have directly welcomed 2,000 tourists from Boston, and to have a snug quarter of a million in the savings bank. Amherst boasts of having spent \$80,000 during the past season in the erection of new buildings. At least, so says correspondence of the Halifax Herald, which is doing good work for Nova Scotia towns in this direction.

She was spoken, all well, on the 25th of May, in the Southern Ocean, and was due in the English Channel in August. She was of 1,000 tons burden, had a full cargo of produce, and was insured for \$35,000. She had a crew of 25 hands. Her first officer, we regret to learn, was Mr. Russell, a son-in-law of Mr. Nathaniel Sheppard, of Harbor Grace Island.
