Side Carnival Draws 11,600 In Four Days

Attendance at the Summerside Lobster Carnival in the past four days has totalled 11,700 paid admissions to the carnival headquarters in the stadium. In the same period, 2,803 suppers have been served. Yesterday a total of 5,098 persons visited the stadium, and suppers totalled 713.

The \$2.50 free-for-all horse race under the lights at the raceway drew the carnival's largest race crowd of 3,100.

Today, the fifth and second last day of the lobster carnival, has been designated as "Miss Prince Edward Island" day, and will be highlighted by the selection of a new queen of the Island when the 17 local contestants appear on stage at the stadium at 9:30 p.m.

Also chosen tonight will be two princesses, and the new queen will be crowned tomorrow, Saturday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. following a coronation motorcade to the stadium from the marine wharf.

Handicraft Booth Draws Attention

SUMMERSIDE — One booth at Civic Stadium that seems to be getting more than its share of attention during the Lobster Carnival is that of the Prince Edward Island Handicraft Branch display.

The main features of this booth are the demonstrations which are given several times a week, of various interesting and entertaining to the passerby, but more important show the many handicrafts which most people in the demonstration of weaving on a loom especially installed in the booth for this purpose. Here, spectators can watch a skilled weaver create fine mats, scarves and so on as the article progresses from the first thread to the final product.

The intricate process of textile painting can also be seen as demonstrated in this booth are also given. Textile painting consists of painting a pre-selected design on some cloth article to beautify it or to fill an unutilized space by the branch.

MAKING STENCILS
To accomplish this a design is first selected and stencils are made to match. Often as many as five stencils are necessary for a single design. The stencils are then placed, one at a time, on the canvas to be painted and each color desired is applied separately. The result is a beautiful, "working" hobby.

Anyone can do these handicrafts after the proper training and this is another reason for the booth at the Lobster Carnival. The two young ladies behind the counter at Civic Stadium are on the regular staff of the Island Handicraft Branch and will gladly provide information to any interested persons regarding classes in handicrafts offered by the branch.
