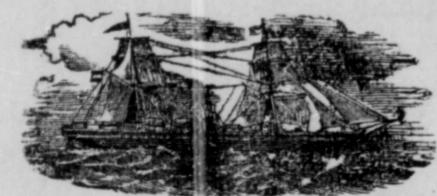

COOK'S SECOND SHOT.

Could Have Had a Senatorship on Payment of \$10,000.

TORONTO, Oct. 12.—The only answer the liberal papers have made to the terrible onslaught of H. H. Cook, Ex-M. P., is to say that Cook's action was inspired by the fact that he had been refused a liberal senatorship. Dr. Hays, the liberal candidate in North Grey, made the assertion at the opening meeting of the campaign in that constituency, with the result that Mr. Cook has thrown another lyddite shell into the ranks of his former political friends. He declares that he was offered a senatorship but refused it. The offer was made him by a trusted agent of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who told him that he could have the senatorship on account of his long and faithful service to the Liberal party by payment of \$10,000. Mr. Cook refused, and wired Laurier that as a result of the offer he would do his utmost to bring about his defeat. The recent manifesto was putting this promise into effect. The charge laid against him produced the second bomb shell.

Mr. W. S. Stewart, the Liberal-Conservative standard-bearer in West Queen's, and others, will address the meeting in Market Hall tonight.

Five Brave Canadians.

LONDON, Thursday, Oct. 13.—A special despatch from Lydenburg says:—"A Boer prisoner tells the story of the way in which a patrol of five troopers of Strathcona's Horse, under Sergeant Brothers, met death. It appears that they were suddenly surrounded by a strong force of Boers. The Canadians indignantly refused to surrender, and a murderous fire was exchanged at short range, until every man in the party was riddled with bullets, but not before each Canadian had accounted for three Boers.
