**3. WEDNESDAY: Household Hint Department.** No. 1: Use glycerine to preserve summer foliage for use as decoration during the winter months. Gather selected branches in August and place the ends in a mixture of one part commercial glycerine and two parts water. This solution should come up to the base of the branches. Place in a shady, cool room or a cellar for five weeks, replacing the solution to the same height as it becomes absorbed. No. 2: When putting up the curtains you may find the hem so stiff with starch that it is difficult to push the rod through. Just dampen the hem, and this will soften the starch for the time being so that the slipping through of the rod is easy. No. 3: From an old, old cook book comes this piece of advice: "Girls, you can't expect to hold a man interested in home and fireside if you can't cook, boil and bake properly. **5. FRIDAY: Hot Cross Buns** are a must at mealtimes today. This is a simple, inexpensive salad for a supper dish—especially good where there are a number to feed. Three cups shredded cabbage, 1-2 tins celery seed, 1 tsp. salt, 1-4 tsp. pepper, 2 tins Canadian sardines, 1-3 cup mayonnaise.

To the shredded cabbage, add the celery seed, salt, pepper and flaked sardines. Add the mayonnaise and toss lightly. Serve on lettuce. Yield—six servings. Incidentally, in last week's "Sheet Cake" (chocolate)—it should have read: "1-2 tsp. baking powder", not "one-half cup".

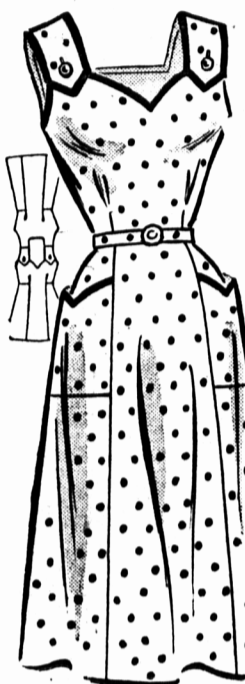

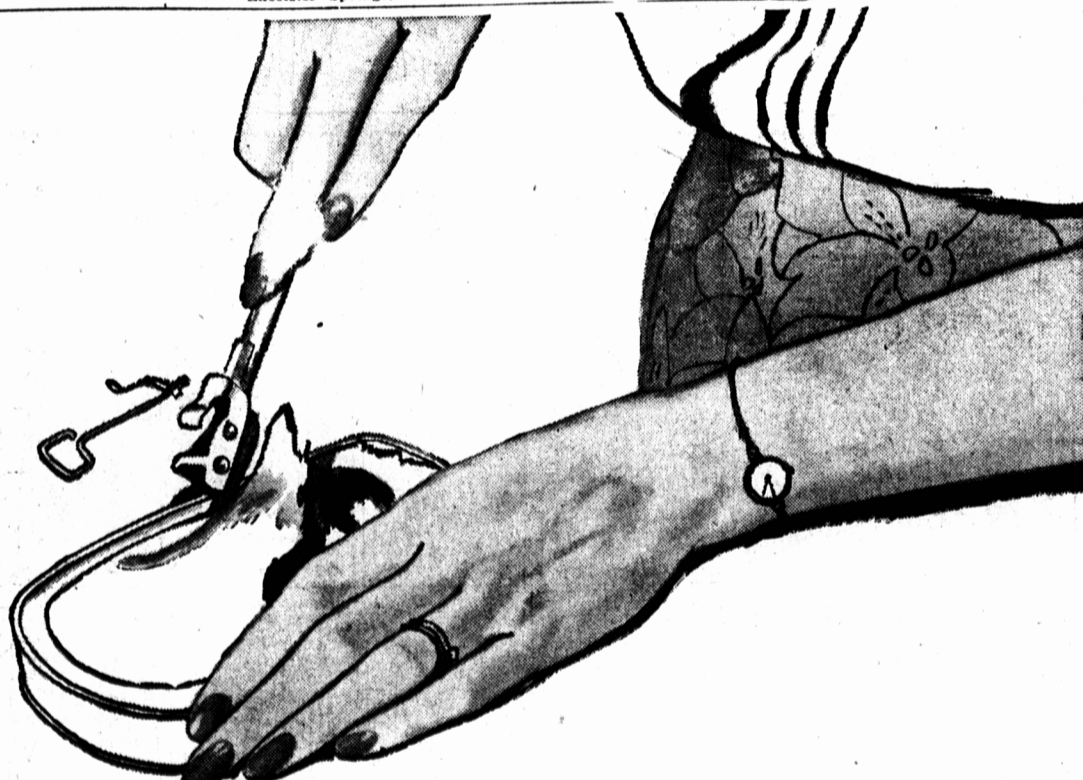
