Highlighting New Year's eve celebrations here will be a number of dances in various halls and auditoriums, and dozens of parties are expected to be held in private homes.

The Charlottetown Hotel is holding a dance from 9 p.m. to 2 a.m., with supper served from midnight to 2 a.m. Dress is optional.

## Penn State Favored To Beat Florida Sat.

Penn State is favored to beat Florida in the Gator Bowl football game Saturday in Jacksonville, Fla., chiefly because of its apparent advantage in the line.

Penn State's starting line averages 222 pounds while Florida averages only 216.

Penn State also has four seniors and three juniors in the starting line and they have been together virtually the entire season. Florida's line, on the other hand, has changed personnel several times because of injuries.

The Gator Bowl is one of three U.S. college bowl and all-star football games scheduled for Saturday. The East all-stars meet the West in the East-West Shrine Game at San Francisco while the North all-stars play the South in the Blue-Gray Game at Montgomery, Ala.

The outcome of the East-West game is rated a toss-up. West coach Dan Devine of Missouri said simply that "we're ready."

Ara Parseghian of Northwestern, assisting head coach Jack Mollenkopf of Purdue in preparing the East squad, said "the skills are there to make for an offensive explosion."

**WORK ON PASSING**

Coach Bob Devaney, meanwhile, put the North squad to work on passing against an already airborne South team in preparation for the Blue-Gray contest.

The South head coach, Tom Nugent of Maryland, continued his wide-open-game strategy by working up a shotgun formation with two widebacks and split ends, and as the coaches polished up their squads for the Blue-Gray game, the Ohio University squad flew to El Paso, Tex., from Columbus and started conditioning for its Christmas party on Friday at the club Monday with West Texas State in the Sun Bowl.

But the climax to U.S. college football action will come New Year's Day when four major bowl games are played—the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif., the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Tex., the Orange Bowl in Miami, Fla., and the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans.

Louisiana State's Tigers arrived in Dallas and immediately left the practice field with enthusiasm while coach Charlie McClendon forecast a wide-open Cotton Bowl game with Texas. Texas, meanwhile, was working at Austin, 200 miles to the south, and will not go to Dallas until Sunday.

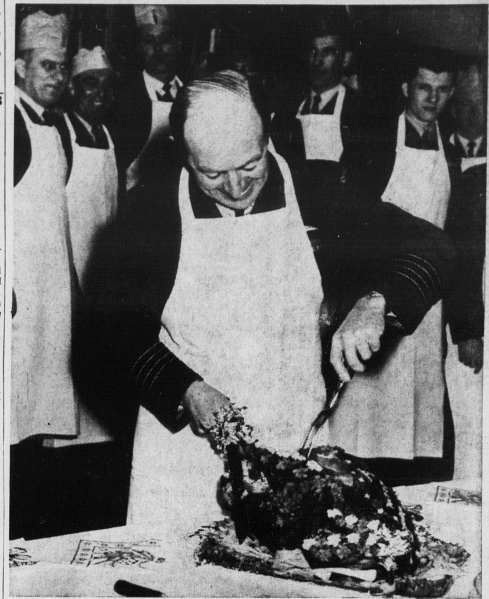

## Tom Bolan Has Hope Of Settling Title Rematch

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Promoter Tom Bolan said Thursday he has high hopes of settling the Sonny Liston-Floyd Patterson heavyweight title rematch within a couple of days despite opposition of World Boxing Association officials to the fight.

The president of Championship Sports Incorporated said Baltimore or Las Vegas, Nev., are the likely sites.

Bolan had a meeting scheduled Thursday night with Patterson's attorney, Jack Nilon. Liston's attorney, and Nilon's attorney at Nilon's New York residence.

"I hope we'll be able to iron out an agreement and reduce it to writing for a contract," said Bolan. "I don't think we'll be able to do it all this time."

Bolan said he isn't concerned about statements made by WBA officials who said Patterson should meet one of the other challengers before fighting Liston again.
