

Islanders Need Victory Tonight In Game With Glace Bay On Local Ice

The Glace Bay Miners who pick the most embarrassing times to defeat their opponents in the Maritime Major Hockey League, will meet the Islanders on the Forum Freeze tonight.

Tonight's game is a must for the Islanders who have tasted three defeats in three outings this week despite the fact they have been playing heads up hockey. Two of their losses came at the hands of the Halifax Atlantics and the other at the hands of the Bay.

The Miners will be tougher to beat tonight than usual. Playing with them will be their coach Hub Macey who has used himself only sparingly in the early part of the league. However he has seen considerable action in the past week and last Tuesday night he centered a line which picked up four goals in the Miners 6-3 win over the Islanders.

The Islanders now are in third place in the M. M. H. L. standings as the result of the Millionaires win over Halifax last night. They need tonight's win if they are to keep pace with the Steel City men.

The Miners on the other hand are only four points behind the Islanders. A win for them would move them to within a game of the local players.

Lou Kiley will return to action for the locals tonight so that the locals will be at full strength.

One week from tonight they will sponsor a dance at the Rollaway Alleys. The ball-room has been donated free of charge by the owner Joey MacDonald and the club is hopeful that as many as possible will attend this function.

Fate Of Beavers In N. B. League Seen Uncertain

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Nov. 27 — (CP) — Whether or not Saint John Beavers will be able to continue in the New Brunswick Senior Hockey League with Moncton Hawks and Fredericton Capitals again appeared uncertain tonight. Their financial position has been shaky from the start.

Murray W. Long, owner and operator of the Saint John Forum, revealed tonight that the players were on their own — without a club executive or head. He understood the team would try to arrange a meeting with Moncton and Fredericton representatives, to be held Sunday at Moncton if possible, and attempt some kind of co-operative arrangement to keep the team functioning. This might take the form of the Saint John players skipping regular salaries and taking a split of the gate.

Mr. Long, who is not connected officially with any Beaver organization, said he had undertaken help financially after the club executive gave up. At present there is no club, as such, and the team has no coach.

Mr. Long said he has contributed about \$1,200 so that Saint John could "keep faith" with Moncton and Fredericton hockey interests and avoid collapse of the team before completion of this week's games. The cellar place Beavers lost 7-4 at Fredericton tonight and are slated to play Saturday at Moncton. A scheduled Moncton at Saint John game tomorrow night has been postponed because of an ice show here.

In addition to his financial help, Mr. Long continued, he had given the team about \$2,000 worth of equipment in an effort to make it possible for the Beavers to carry on.

Under the circumstances, he believed no attempt would be made to obtain a coach or new players unless the team reached some agreement with Moncton and Fredericton. George (Buck) Boucher had been considered as a coach but after a few days visit here left without the job.

If Beavers fold, Saint John hockey fans who have turned out in only small numbers this season will have to be content with high school and industrial league games.

Claims Acting As Trustee Of McCurdy Cup

GLACE BAY, N. S., Nov. 27 — (CP)—Glace Bay Caledonians still have the McCurdy Cup—have they?

The symbol of Maritime English rugby supremacy is in the hands of Donald MacInnis, playing manager of a team which entered this year's schedule under the name of Glace Bay Caledonians.

But Glace Bay's "Mr. Football" says the team doesn't exist.

Charlie MacVicar, manager and coach of the great Caledonians which dominated the field in Eastern Canada for years, claimed tonight "there is no true Caledonia team or Caledonia Club. Both retired some years ago."

He said MacInnis, who took over the cup after his team was ruled out of the finals, should hand it back to the Maritime Rugby Union executive. It would then be passed along to St. Dunstan's University of Charlottetown, this year's official winner.

But MacInnis said his position as a union executive member entitled him to act as trustee of the cup. He had not taken custody as a representative of Glace Bay.

He blasted union officers for allowing St. Dunstan's and Halifax Wanderers, this year's finalists, to enter competition eight days after the deadline set at the annual meeting, and without executive approval.

Millionaires Score 2-1 Victory Over Atlantics In Game At Halifax

HALIFAX, Nov. 27 — (CP) — Sydney Millionaires, playing light defensively hockey on a slow, soft sheet of ice, upset Halifax Atlantics 2-1 tonight in a Maritime Major Hockey League game played before a crowd of 2,800—second smallest of the season.

Reg Campbell, Sydney forward, gave his club a 2-1 lead less than a minute before the end of the second period. In the third session, Atlantics put on heavy pressure and had a wide edge in territory. At this stage they were outshooting Millionaires two to one. But Nick Pidsodny in the Sydney game, playing one of his good games, refused to be beaten.

The game was held up for nearly 10 minutes in the third period by a power failure on the lighting circuit directly over the ice.

Campbell and George Robertson were the Sydney marksmen. Bill Ford scored Halifax's lone goal. It came midway through the lacklustre first period on a pass from Don McLaughlin. Pidsodny flipped to the ice but the puck went over his pads. A couple of minutes later McLaughlin was penalized for using his elbow on Dunc MacIntyre's face.

Ronnie Rowe got a misconduct penalty from referee Charlie Goode after a sharp interchange when Rowe slammed his stick against the boards in objection to the puck-hugging tactics of Billy Watson while McLaughlin was off.

Robertson's deadlock goal came while Joe Lepine was serving a penalty for interference. Campbell

scored the clincher, cruising along unopposed on the right wing after taking a pass from Johnny Morrow near his own blueline.

Atlantics pulled out goalie Roy McMeekin in the last minute of play and forced three faceoffs in Sydney territory, but couldn't get the puck past Pidsodny.
