THE TERMS OF PEACE.

Further Explanations are Asked For.

DISCUSSION WILL BE RESUMED WHEN THESE ARE OBTAINED.

Some Modifications Said to Have Been Obtained.

RUNNING THE BLOCKADE.

Food Supplies Safely Landed at Porto Rico.

NAVAL RESERVES AT NEWFOUNDLAND

Five Hundred Fishermen to be Enrolled.

WILL BE DRILLED BY INSTRUCTORS FROM ENGLAND.

Newfoundland the Only Colony Where Experiment is Tried.

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., August 2.—Goschen, first Lord of the Admiralty, has arranged to organize a naval reserve among the Newfoundland fishermen, enrolling 500 who will be drilled by instructors sent from England.

Fortifications are being erected especially for this purpose.

The men are receiving \$50 each cash for each month engaged.

Newfoundland is the only colony where the experiment is being tried.

IN A BAD WAY.

Steamers on the Rocks and Ashore.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 2.—Reports received from Alaska say that Dutch Harbor is crowded with a forlorn lot.

The steamers of the fleet, 20 of which left Seattle to ply on the Yukon, 12 were wrecked at or near Dutch Harbor.

Four are on the rocks, two are ashore, and six others are laid up, with broken backs.

Mail and Empire: Dewey's claim to undying fame is now placed on a solid foundation. An American investigator has found that the admiral is the thirty-fifth in direct descent from the Earl of Winchester, who was the most distinguished of the twenty-five barons who forced King John to sign Magna Charta on the plain of Runnymede, June 15th, 1215; and the thirty-third in direct descent from Alfred the Great. If Uncle Sam goes in for imperialism and establishes a throne, he will have a properly qualified king ready to fill it. Great is Dewey.

Revised returns of the recent general elections in Germany show that the Socialists polled 2,120,000 votes as compared with 1,786,000 in 1893. This was considerably more than any other party. The nearest approach to it was the vote of the Centre, or Clerical Party, which amounted to 1,333,000 as compared with 1,468,000 at the preceding election.

THEY WANT TO LEAVE

Santiago Traders Fear Cuban Rule.

AND ARE SELLING OUT AT A GREAT SACRIFICE.

Anxious for an Assurance of American Occupation.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, July 31.—The situation here is an extremely delicate one. On the one hand the Cubans clamor for the entrance of their troops into the city. On the other, the Spanish merchants and foreign residents dread such a possibility, and the uncertainty as to the final conditions causes grave apprehensions.

The merchants all are anxious to dispose of their merchandise at a sacrifice and to leave the island rather than to remain under Cuban rule. They say a definite assurance by proclamation of the continuation of the American occupation of the city until complete order is guaranteed under an established government is necessary to any resumption of business and to the future prosperity of the city's commerce.

It seems from a survey of the situation, the nature of the Cubans and their native army, that it is fairly doubtful whether they would be able to be maintained. It appears prudent at this juncture to make clear the facts and conditions and thus anticipate some possible criticism of the drastic measures which may be rendered necessary here shortly, measures which if unexplained might lay the military governor and the authorities open to censure. The feature of the situation, not without its amusing character, is in the constant stream of native residents who are presenting claims to the authorities here against the United States government for losses sustained at the hands of the Cuban troops, damage to property, robbery, plunder, etc., during the last three years. All foreign orders for goods have been commuted.

The continuation of the occupation and the definite establishment of an American protectorate are loudly demanded by the better element.

Local merchants, Spanish, foreign and native, are drawing up a petition requesting the establishment of a bonded warehouse at Santiago, so that in case they desire to re-ship goods to Porto Rico they may be saved the payment of double duty. Under the Spanish regime, the entry of goods in bond here was unknown. Merchandise imported and reshipped to Porto Rico, another Spanish colony, paid duties twice.

Letters received indicate a probable rush to this point of a horde of adventurers, theatrical managers, soldiers of fortune and the like. But it would be a new Klondike deception, for surely there is no opportunity at present that should tempt anyone and no money to be had by anybody.

COLONIES AND GREAT BRITAIN.

Lieut-Col. Hughes has a Scheme.

HOW THE SCHEME IS TO BE WORKED OUT.

Chances to Help Great Brittain in Military and Naval Matters.

OTTAWA, July 30.—Lieut.-Col. Sam Hughes is here on business with the Militia department, and is full of a scheme for the colonies helping Great Britain in military and naval matters.

"What I would like to see done," said he, "is to have each colony of the British empire regarded as a regimental territory. Then in Canada would have one corps, the 1st battalion, away on active service for the empire. The second battalion would be made up of permanent companies at the various headquarters in Canada. There would also be recruiting stations for men to take the place of the permanent corps who would be recruited from the militia of the country. Thus our men would go from the militia to the 2nd battalion and from the second battalion to the first battalion on active service. This plan would work for the artillery and infantry and eventually could be extended to the cavalry.

He also advocated training ships on the same principle as those established in Australia, where boys between six and fourteen years are schooled for the navy. Statistics show that 96 per cent of the lads brought up in this way make good men and capital sailors. He thinks Canada would supply plenty of recruits to the 100th Regiment if it were repatriated.
