

# Islanders In Second Shutout Over Moncton

## Halifax Welcomes Curlers For Dominion Bonspiel; Competition Begins Today

HALIFAX, March 5—(CP)—The only man who went out on a limb today so far as the Canadian curling championship is concerned was Mayor Gordon Kinley of Halifax.

He told each of the 11 Provincial championship rinks he hoped they would win.

It was a different story with the curlers. Feted and welcomed by the Halifaxians in a round of receptions that started early this morning, the curlers cagily forecast a Western victory.

Out at Dalhousie University Arena, where the championship play starts tomorrow, the pre-bonspiel talk went like this: "It looks like Manitoba but watch out for Saskatchewan. Those boys are hot. And don't forget Northern Ontario."

It was a rink from Kirkland Lake that walked off with the title last year with seven victories and two defeats. This year the northerners are represented by Wally Johnston's quartet from Copper Cliff.

Roy Forsyth's rink from Winnipeg still ruled favorite by a narrow margin although Johnny Franklin's stone wielders from Rostown ran a close second.

Gordon Campbell, skip of the Ontario rink from the Toronto Granite Club, sized it up this way: "Don't count us out. We can meet the west with their knock-out game but to us it's a take-out game."

Campbell is the only ex-champion among the curlers this year. In 1935 he skipped a Hamilton

Thistle rink to the title and is back again for another crack at it.

The Nova Scotians, who haven't won the championship since 1927, have already taken honors as hosts for the 1951 bonspiel.

Donald Oyer's rink from Kentville was the first to greet the arriving curlers when their special train pulled in this morning.

There was a procession into the rotunda of the station, headed by a pipe band, and the official greeting, long after midnight.

Today the curlers were given another official greeting. Mayor Kinley again extended the hospitality of the city and Mr. Justice L. D. Currie welcomed the contestants on behalf of Nova Scotia.

Last minute touches were given the Dalhousie Arena, specially arranged for the big bonspiel. Most of the curlers had a look at the trim ice surface where the end boards have been covered with bleachers. All dressed up, the rink will seat about 3,000.

The draw was still undecided late tonight. The competing rinks are:

## Junior Abbies Score 15-2 Victory Over S'side Juniors In Opener

Displaying too much speed and power, Art Perry's Junior Abbies buried the Bob Schurman-coached Summerside Juniors under a 15-2 defeat here last night in the opening game of a home and home, total goal series for the Provincial Junior hockey championship.

The second and final game of the series is expected to be played at Crystal Rink, Summerside this Wednesday.

Abbies held a wide-margin on the play in all three periods despite hard working efforts on the part of a game bunch of Summerside pucksters who were just no match for the locals. Abbies outscored them 2-1 in the first frame, went high, wide and handsome in the second to fire home seven goals without a reply, and added six more to Summerside's one in the closing session.

The big goalgetters for the Abbies were Keith Dalziel and Arnold McCallum with the hat trick each, while Phil Jardine, Joe Coyle, Brian Lewis and Bill Leonard all scored up to a brace each. George Scantlebury accounted for Abbies' tally. Defenceman Don Burgess collected three assists while rearguard Lewis MacDonald and forwards McCallum, Howard Glover picked up three apiece, while Jardine, Don MacLean and Leonard assisted on two each and Dalziel, Scantlebury, Lewis, and Jim Flannigan one each.

Playing a standout game back on the blue line for the Summerside crew, Ron MacArthur notched up their first goal unassisted while Neil Walker potted the other on an assist from Ed Dalton. MacArthur played nearly 60 minutes of hockey back on the visiting defence and came up with a top-notch performance.

An overworked Summerside goalie, Rogers, got little protection from his team, and despite the 15 goals that went past him, played a smart game for his team to kick aside 32 other efforts. His

## Outplay Moncton For 5-0 Victory In Third Game Of Semi-Finals

MONCTON, N. B., March 5—(CP)—Charlottetown Islanders played brilliantly in all departments tonight to blank Moncton Hawks 5-0 and take their second straight win in the five of nine semi-final series of the Maritime Major Hockey League playoffs.

Islanders now have two wins and Hawks one. Fourth game of the series will be played here tomorrow night.

Slim Johnny Horeck, playing smart two-way hockey paced Islanders to their win. He scored a pair of goals, including the opening tally of the game. But it was the inspired playing of Weston (Bucko) Trainor that sparked Islanders. He was a standout performer and his dazzling assaults on the Moncton cage highlighted the game. He scored the third goal. Other Charlottetown marksmen were Johnny Morrow and Mac Beaton.

Smart defensive play by the Islanders' defence and good netminding by Hal Gordon robbed Hawks of several scoring chances.

Islanders on the other hand displayed the form which led them to top spot in the league standings early in the season and kept them there throughout the schedule. They dominated the play most of the way, and even when playing short handed on two occasions stymied most of Hawks' attempts to organize power plays.

Only three penalties were called by referee Casey Bradshaw and Pete Mill.

Big Phil Vitale, who played a sound defensive game for Islanders, drew a warning from Bradshaw near the end of the game for making an obscene gesture toward the crowd when they cheered loudly after he had been struck in the face by a flying puck.

## Richard's Case Before National League President

MONTREAL, March 5—(CP)—The case of Montreal Canadiens' Maurice (Rocket) Richard and a scuffle he had with referee Hugh McLean of the National Hockey League remains before league president Clarence Campbell tonight.

From Mr. Campbell's office came the word: "There will be a statement but it will not be tonight."

Mr. Campbell had scheduled a conference with N.H.L. referee-in-chief Carl Voss, and declined to say anything about Richard's tangle with McLean.

Hereabouts, among hockey fans, there was talk of little else except the Rocket and the \$50 fine he received Saturday night with a match-misconduct penalty and the Sunday tussle he had in a New York hotel lobby with the referee of Saturday night's Canadiens' game against Detroit.
