Although the fishing of flounders in this Province has never been done on a commercial basis efforts will be made this summer to organize the industry. Recently Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, and Mr. P. A. Murnaghan, Deputy Minister, visited St. Mary's Bay, in the vicinity of Digby, N. S., to examine some of the smaller boats in use there...

Departmental officials here are definitely interested in this type of boat and equipment, as they feel that with the expected development of fresh and frozen fish the boats will bring a new type of fish with a real market appeal...

Reports last night indicated that the east coast line of the Island was relatively free of ice formation, and lobster fishermen, except in the Murray Harbor area, expected to experience little difficulty running lines today at noon. All along the north shore of King's to East Point the coast is clear of ice, and continues free to Panmure Island except for a small loose ice pack which floated in off Souris yesterday...

THURSDAY

Local labor will be employed to as great an extent as possible during the resurfacing of city streets, it was stated last night at a special meeting of the City Council by Mr. Harold Hewitt, of the Donald Inspection Company, Montreal, who was called by the City of Charlottetown to examine the streets here...

The Council meeting last night was devoted almost entirely to discussion of the street problem, with Councillor F. J. Storey, chairman of the Streets Committee, leading the talks. Mr. Hewitt also stated that he expected there would be approximately four miles of streets finished before the end of June and a total of 14 miles, depending on weather conditions, by the time operations have to be called off in the fall...

Employees of the City Street Department last night at a special meeting of the City Council for a 44-hour work week with the same 'take home' pay they receive at present. The request, in the form of a resolution, was read by Councillor F. J. Storey, Chairman of the Street Committee. The Council decided to leave the matter in the hands of the Street Committee...

A decision to become an informal type of organization was reached as the Charlottetown Camera Club met last evening in the Harris Memorial Gallery, president pro tem Frank Tinney in the chair. Mr. Tinney noted some of the lessons learned from experience as a member of an earlier club and discussed the value of exchanging information on experiments, types of cameras and equipment, and from the criticism of some of the more highly skilled men in the profession. Possible

picture taking projects were outlined. Each member in turn commented on the various subjects and an interesting round table discussion developed. New members were welcomed with membership still being open. The next meeting will be held in a month's time with Mr. Douglas Durber giving a talk on photographic lenses. As a project each member brings one picture taken on the holiday of the 24th...

Mr. Angus Chapman, about 60 years of age, was found dead in a booth at the New England Cafe last night. Dr. L. E. Prowse, coroner, decided that death was due to natural causes and no inquest would be necessary. Mr. Chapman resided at 137 Hillsboro Street...

No information was available immediately as to his relative. It was understood he was boarding at 137 Hillsboro Street.

FRIDAY

Lieut.-Col. H. Gordon Williams, officer commanding the 28th L. A. Regiment, is retiring to the Supplementary Reserve of Officers following 25 years service to the Army. His retirement will become official on July 1, but actually he has relinquished command of the regiment. Although there has been no definite order to retire, he is called for silence. The unit will pass to Major E. M. Wellner temporarily pending a permanent appointment...

It is expected that Major Wellner, who has been second-in-command of the regiment, will be promoted to lieutenant colonel and given command of the unit. Officers, N.C.O.'s and men of the Artillery gathered last night at the Armouries to say farewell to Col. Williams. It took the form of a lobster supper and shortly before the end of the proceedings R.S.M. H. Hobbs called for silence. He then presented the retiring colonel with a beautiful silver tray, suitably inscribed from the members of the regiment, complete with a silver service and 8 silver goblets...

Mr. P. S. Fielding, Deputy Provincial Secretary and coordinator of civil defence measures for the Province, has returned from Ottawa where he attended a civil defence welfare and operational study week carried out under the auspices of the Department of National Health and Welfare...

On Monday and Tuesday of this week the Dominion-Provincial Advisory Board on Civil Defence met under the chairmanship of Hon. Paul Martin. This Province's representatives on this Board are Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare and P. S. Fielding. The Hon. Mr. Matheson returned to this Province yesterday...

An increase of approximately 30 percent in membership was noted at the annual meeting of the Central Farmers' Co-Operative Association. The increase brought the membership to 452 and the opinion was expressed that at least another 100 members would be added this year...

The report of the Association revealed that last year sales had soared well over the half-million dollar mark to reach a total of \$656,905.39 for the highest amount of business transacted since the Association was formed. The greatest volume of sales was seen in the grocery department and it was stated at the meeting by Mr. C. MacLean, manager of the store, that the great department had been operating at a loss. Mr. MacLean said this was due to the high cost of serving the public and also to the fact that under present conditions profits from meats were small...

The Sabre jets yesterday found a break in the heavily overcast sky yesterday afternoon that gave four of them an opportunity to pay what might, by understatement, be called a fast visit to Summerside and Charlottetown. The four jets flew over Summerside at least six times but as the direction of their approach was always in doubt, every interested observer who did not have a clear view of the sky in all directions had to be sharp to get a look at these speedy aircraft...
